## What is the problem?

The 2011 New York Youth Risk Behavior Survey indicates that among high school students:

## Sexual Risk Behaviors

- $42 \%$ ever had sexual intercourse.
- $6 \%$ had sexual intercourse for the first time before age 13 years.
- $13 \%$ had sexual intercourse with four or more persons during their life.
- $31 \%$ had sexual intercourse with at least one person during the 3 months before the survey.
- $37 \%$ did not use a condom during last sexual intercourse. (1)
- $79 \%$ did not use birth control pills or Depo-Provera (or any injectable birth control), Nuva Ring (or any birth control ring), implanon (or any implant), or any IUD before last sexual intercourse. (1)
-     - were never taught in school about AIDS or HIV infection.


## Alcohol and Other Drug Use

- $22 \%$ drank alcohol or used drugs before last sexual intercourse. (1)
- $3 \%$ used a needle to inject any illegal drug into their body one or more times during their life.


## What are the solutions?

Better health education • More comprehensive health services • More supportive policies • More family involvement

## What is the status?

The 2010 New York School Health Profiles indicates that among high schools:

## Health Education

- $51 \%$ required students to take 2 or more health education courses.
- $77 \%$ had a health education curriculum that addresses all 8 national standards for health education.
- $92 \%$ taught 8 key pregnancy, HIV, or other STD prevention topics in a required course.
- $84 \%$ taught 4 key topics related to condom use in a required course.
- $99 \%$ taught how to access valid and reliable health information, products, or services related to HIV, other STDs, and pregnancy in a required course.
- $59 \%$ had a lead health education teacher who received professional development during the 2 years before the survey on HIV prevention.
- $50 \%$ had a lead health education teacher who received professional development during the 2 years before the survey on pregnancy prevention.


## Health Services

- $92 \%$ had a full-time registered nurse who provides health services to students at school.


## Supportive Policies

- $60 \%$ had a gay/straight alliance or similar club.
- $35 \%$ provided curricula or supplementary materials and engaged in 5 practices related to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgendered, or questioning (LGBTQ) youth.


## Family Involvement

- $42 \%$ provided parents and families health information to increase parent and family knowledge of HIV prevention, STD prevention, or teen pregnancy prevention.
