The original baseline data (1994) would not have been comparable to data from 1998 onward. However, the original baseline year, 1994, was later reinstated because the questions used to obtain the 1994 data were asked in later years. Data from 1998 were then dropped because a different set of questions had been used to obtain the 1998 estimates.

This objective is identical to Healthy People 2000 objective 3.8.

Data by education status are age adjusted using the age groups 25-34, 35-44, 45-64, and 65 and over. Age-adjusted percents are weighted sums of age-specific percents.
