Responses of "always" to the above question were considered to be "satisfactory communication skills" for purposes of measuring this subobjective.

The 2000 baseline data were collected as part of a supplement to the MEPS using provider communication questions (referred to as CAHPS^(R) 2.0 questions) developed for the National CAHPS^(R) Benchmarking Database.

The original baseline was revised from 58 percent to 59 percent by the data provider in December, 2005. The target was proportionally adjusted from 65 percent to 66 percent to reflect the revised baseline using the original target-setting method.

Objective 11-6 moved from developmental to measurable at the Healthy People Midcourse Review. Four subobjectives were created, each focusing on a different aspect of provider communication skills.

For some objectives, data do not meet the criteria for statistical reliability, data quality, or confidentiality and have been suppressed. Information on suppression of data for the major Healthy People 2010 data systems has been published in a *Healthy People Statistical Note*.¹
