The questions for this objective are periodically included in supplements to NHIS. BRFSS items are collected in rotating modules (approximately every 3 years).

Data (except those by education status) are age adjusted to the 2000 standard population using the age groups 18-24, 25-34, 35-44, 45-64, and 65 years and over. Data by education status are age adjusted using the age groups 25-34, 35-44, 45-64, and 65 years and over. Age-adjusted percents are weighted sums of age-specific percents. For a discussion of age adjustment see Part A, section 7.

This objective differs from Healthy People 2000 objective 7.11 in that the data used to monitor objective 7.11 were not age adjusted.

For some measures, data do not meet the criteria for statistical reliability, data quality, or confidentiality and have been suppressed. Information on suppression of data for the major Healthy People 2010 data systems has been published in a *Healthy People Statistical Note*.¹

optional module of the BRFSS, which is made available to States for administration annually. The number of States that select the Firearms module varies every year. In 1998, 4 States used the

optional Firearms module.

National data from the NHIS and state data from the BRFSS may not be comparable for a number of reasons, including mode of question administration, context of questions, question wording, and survey

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sampling frame.

Data by education status are age adjusted using the age groups 25-34, 35-44, 45-64, and 65 years and over. Age-adjusted percents are weighted sums of age-specific percents.
