Comments States are required to report fetal deaths if they

occur in the 20th week of pregnancy or later, or if they weigh at least 350 grams.¹ The number of fetal deaths may be underreported in part because of

variations in reporting requirements by States.

A description of the primary measurement used to determine the infant's gestational age—the interval between the first day of the last normal menstrual period (LMP) and the birth—has been published by NCHS.²

A description of the perinatal death measurement has been published by NCHS.¹

The original baseline of 7.5 perinatal deaths per 1,000 live births and fetal deaths was revised to 7.3 perinatal deaths per 1,000 as the result of changes in methodology. The target was proportionally adjusted from 4.4 perinatal deaths per 1,000 live births and fetal deaths to 4.4 perinatal deaths per 1,000 to reflect the revised baseline using the original target-setting method.

For some measures, data do not meet the criteria for statistical reliability, data quality, or confidentiality and have been suppressed. Information on suppression of data for the major Healthy People 2010 data systems has been published in a *Healthy People Statistical Note*.³
