## **Nursing and Related Care Homes as Reported From the 1982 National Master Facility Inventory Survey**

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Statistics on nursing and related care homes include the number of homes, beds, residents, and nurses, as well as types of ownership, geographic distribution, and level of certification. This report is based on data from the 1982 National Master Facility Inventory Survey.

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# Nursing and Related Care Homes

## Introduction

This report presents data from the 1982 National Master Facility Inventory Survey, which was limited to nursing and related care homes in the United States. Tables shown in this report include statistics on number of homes, beds, residents, nurses, inpatient days, occupancy rates, admissions, and discharges. These variables are distributed by ownership, bed-size group, geographic region, level of certification, and State.

The National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) conducted its first NMFI Survey in 1963, followed by surveys in 1967, 1969, 1971, 1973, 1976, 1978, 1980, and 1982. Prior to the 1978 survey, the National Master Facility Inventory (NMFI) included hospitals, nursing and related care homes, and other types of inpatient health facilities. Those other types included homes for the blind, deaf, mentally retarded, and emotionally disturbed. The 1978,<sup>1</sup> 1980,<sup>2</sup> and 1982 inventories have data only on nursing and related care homes. Data for hospitals are now obtained directly from the American Hospital Association. For convenience, the terms "nursing and related care homes" and "nursing homes" are used interchangeably in this report.

The NCHS definition of "nursing homes" (see appendix III) generally states that a home must maintain three or more inpatient beds and, at the minimum, it must provide one or more personal care services (such as help with eating, walking, correspondence, dressing, bathing, or using the toilet). A facility that only provides services to the mentally ill or the mentally retarded is not classified as a nursing home (it is out of scope) by NMFI definition. A facility that provides services to all types of residents but at present serves only the mentally ill and/or the mentally retarded is classified as a nursing home (that is, in scope).

A total of 26,817 inpatient facilities in the United States can be labeled as "nursing homes." These include not only the nursing homes covered by the NMFI but also the hospital-based homes. (See table I, appendix IV.) This report focuses on those facilities covered by the NMFI.

Prior to 1976, NCHS collected NMFI data via a mail questionnaire sent to each facility. After that time, NCHS purchased data tapes from States that compiled facility information as part of their licensure process. NCHS still uses the mail questionnaire in those States where licensure data are not available. Use of State data has resulted in the additions and deletions to the NMFI described in the following paragraphs.

In 1980, California was able to identify more than 1,000

residential community care facilities (RCCF's)<sup>2</sup> and in 1982 2,000 more. These were in addition to those RCCF's that were on the NMFI file before 1980. The addition of the 1982 RCCF's brought the total of RCCF's to about 5,000. In 1980, for the first time, Michigan furnished NCHS with a data file containing more than 2,500 adult foster care homes (AFCH's). Results from the 1982 NMFI survey showed that many of these homes were out of scope because they provided services only to mentally ill and mentally retarded patients.

The 7,228 RCCF's and AFCH's in California and Michigan are presented separately and are referred to as "residential facilities" in tables 1-3. These residential facilities are presented separately because the data as submitted to NCHS did not include enough information to determine the number of homes that were in scope.

The 1982 NMFI for the first time identifies family care homes in Florida and Kentucky. The 429 Florida adult congregate living facilities and the 373 Kentucky family care homes are defined in the Technical notes section (appendix I). Totals for these types of homes are shown separately in tables under the category "residential facilities."

Beginning in 1980, all identifiable hospital-based nursing homes and extended care facilities were excluded from the NMFI because some States did not include them in their files. The Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) file was obtained to more effectively remove all hospital-based nursing homes from the NMFI file. The data displayed in table I of this report from the HCFA file exclude those hospital-based homes that only serve the mentally ill or mentally retarded. There were 730 hospital-based homes with 58,677 beds. Table I shows data about these homes and their beds by State. (See appendix IV.) Both files, HCFA and NMFI, exclude hospital-based homes operated by the Veterans Administration. There were about 100 such homes with approximately 9,000 beds at the end of fiscal year 1981 according to the Veterans Administration.<sup>3</sup> Counts of these homes do not appear in tables of this report.

This report also shows the number of nonresponding homes for which imputation could not be made because no data from previous years (before 1982) were available. There are 238 such homes. Table I also distributes these homes by State. (See appendix IV.)

To compare 1982 with 1980 figures, it is suggested that one use the figures posted under "total homes," because these

figures do not include the hospital-based and nonresponding homes. In addition to the recommendation made above, any comparison between data from the 1980 or the 1982 NMFI's and earlier NMFI's must be made with extreme caution.

If comparisons are attempted, it is suggested that they be made among larger homes (25 beds or more), because the ad-

ditions, deletions, and definitional changes to the surveys generally apply to smaller homes. A comparison of data from the NMFI for selected years 1969–80 is available.<sup>4</sup> The counts of hospital-based nursing homes should also be subtracted when comparing data from those pre-1980 surveys with the 1980 and 1982 surveys.

# Highlights

The following statistics represent highlights from the tables presented in this report (see detailed tables). Additional tables and an overview of the 1982 NMFI Survey data have been published elsewhere.<sup>5</sup>

## Table 1

Of the 25,849 nursing and related care homes, about 31 percent of the homes were accounted for by residential facilities. (See appendix III for definition of residential facilities.) Because only four States (California, Michigan, Florida, and Kentucky) reported having residential facilities, many may be reported as “nursing homes” in the remaining 46 States plus the District of Columbia.

## Tables 2 and 3

Nursing and related care homes contained a total of 1,642,067 beds and 1,493,406 residents. Beds and residents in homes of four States, California (13 percent), Illinois (6 percent), New York (7 percent), and Texas (6 percent) accounted for one-third of the Nation’s total.

## Table 4

The U.S. average for the number of nursing home beds per 1,000 persons age 65 years and over was 56.2. The States with the four highest averages were Iowa (97.2), Nebraska (90.2), South Dakota (86.8), and Wisconsin (86.0). At the other extreme, New Mexico (22.4), Florida (23.8), Arizona (30.7), and Hawaii (31.9) had the four lowest averages.

## Table 5

Female residents represented 71 percent of all residents (990,601) in nursing and related care homes for which age and sex of residents are reported. Forty percent of the total number of female residents in nursing homes were 85 years and over. Male residents represented 29 percent of residents in nursing and related care homes. Twenty-five percent of all males were 85 years of age and over. The ratio of women to men increased with age. The population of residents under 65 years of age contained about the same number of men as women, but the 85 years and over age group had almost four times as many women as men.

## Table 6

Of the 17,819 nursing homes, only 34 percent were homes with bed size less than 50. Three States—Maine, Hawaii, and North Carolina—accounted for 62 percent of homes with bed size 3–9. About 2 percent of homes had a bed size of 300 or more. Thirty-eight percent of those homes were in New York and Illinois. New York and Illinois also accounted for 28 percent of homes with 200–299 beds.

## Tables 7 and 8

Homes of Hawaii, Maine, New Mexico, North Carolina, Vermont, and West Virginia had a high proportion of their beds in small homes (3–24 beds). When examining the Nation’s proportion of beds in small homes, it was discovered that those States mentioned above had proportions that were three times greater than the national average. In contrast, homes of the District of Columbia, New York, and Pennsylvania had a greater proportion of their beds in large homes (300 beds or more). These States had proportions more than two times greater than the national average.

## Tables 9–11

Twenty-five percent of the Nation’s nursing homes were government and nonprofit operated homes, while the remaining 75 percent of homes were proprietary homes. Nursing homes operated by the government have the smallest percent (7 percent) of beds, and nonprofit homes were second with only 22 percent.

Despite the national average, one in every five States had more than 50 percent of its nursing home residents in government and nonprofit operated homes. These States were Alaska, Pennsylvania, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Wyoming, Minnesota, Montana, and Nebraska, plus the District of Columbia.

## Tables 12 and 13

Nursing homes in the North Central and the South Regions of the country made up 64 percent of all homes (17,819). There was a larger number of small nursing homes with bed size 3–24 in the Northeast and South Regions of the country. This also was true for proprietary homes.



**Table 14**

Of the 17,819 nursing homes, about 40 percent of the homes were certified as skilled nursing facilities (SNF's), while 31 percent were certified as intermediate care facilities (ICF's). (Facilities certified as both SNF's and ICF's have been classified as SNF's.) One State, California, had 1,085 homes certified as SNF's.

**Table 15**

Of the 1,508,732 beds in nursing homes, approximately 57 percent were in homes certified as SNF's, 29 percent were in homes certified as ICF's, 13 percent were in homes not certified, and less than 1 percent were in homes the certification of which is unknown.

**Table 16**

Data presented in table 16 show that there were 681,958 beds certified by medicare and medicaid to provide skilled care and 417,185 beds certified by medicaid to provide intermediate care. The difference between data in this table and data in table 15 is that this table provides certified beds by their particular level of certification while table 15 shows total beds by the certification of the facility.

**Table 17**

There were more residents living in nursing homes certified as SNF's than ICF's. About 58 percent of all residents lived in SNF's<sup>1</sup> and about 29 percent of all residents lived in ICF's. One State, California, accounted for 12 percent of the residents in SNF's.

**Tables 18–22**

Tables 18–22 show the distribution of nurses by State, geographic region, type of ownership, and bed size. Because data on nurses by ownership and bed size were not available for Connecticut and Florida, data for 1982 were imputed by using 1980 data. As a result of not being able to impute data on nurses by type of ownership and bed size, totals in table 18 are greater than totals in tables 19–22. When using data from this section, it should be taken into consideration that those nurses

hired under contract are not included in figures from these tables.

In 1982, a total of 45,391 full-time registered nurses (RN's), 37,847 part-time RN's, 67,221 full-time licensed practical nurses (LPN's), and 37,645 part-time LPN's provided health and related care services to nursing home residents in the United States. Nursing homes in most States employed more full-time LPN's than full-time RN's. In Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, and Utah, the number of full-time LPN's was double the number of full-time RN's. Conversely, Connecticut, New Jersey, and Washington were the States that had at the minimum 200 more full-time RN's than full-time LPN's. When the national rates for nurses per 100 beds were calculated using the imputed data on nurses for Florida and Connecticut (see tables A and B), the rate was 4.5 for full-time LPN's, 2.5 for part-time LPN's, 3.0 for full-time RN's, and 2.5 for part-time RN's.

Data from tables 19 and 21 indicated that the proprietary homes hired the most full-time RN's and LPN's. This is not surprising when one takes into consideration the large percent of the Nation's total of nursing homes that proprietary homes constitute. The proprietary homes in general had the lowest rates for full-time nurses per 100 beds. After the rates for full-time nurses per 100 beds were computed, the government homes were found to have a rate of 4.2 for RN's and 5.6 for LPN's, followed by the nonprofit homes (3.3 RN's per 100 beds; 3.8 LPN's per 100 beds) and proprietary homes (2.5 RN's per 100 beds; 4.2 LPN's per 100 beds).

Of government homes, 44 percent were classified as skilled nursing facilities (SNF's) and 32 percent were classified as intermediate care facilities (ICF's), while 38 and 32 percent of the proprietary homes were classified as SNF's and ICF's, respectively. (See table C.) The government also had more homes of larger size (the average number of beds per home was 121; 24 homes had 500 beds or more). The nonprofit homes were second (the average number of beds per home was 95; 22 homes had 500 beds or more), and proprietary homes were last (the average number of beds per home was 80; 9 homes had 500 beds or more).

As noted in a previous report, nursing home staffing patterns are particularly influenced by certification status and sizes of nursing homes.<sup>2</sup> One reason SNF's have more RN's than noncertified facilities is that SNF's are required to main-

tain 24-hour coverage by RN's. The ICF's are also required to have nurses. In general, larger homes have more nurses because they are more likely to be an SNF or an ICF.

Imputations made to Connecticut and Florida data on nursing homes were added to the appropriate regions. (See tables A and B.) The Northeast and the West Regions had the highest rates of RN's per 100 beds. Both regions had a rate of at least 4.0 for full-time RN's, above the national average of 3.0.

The Northeast had the highest rate of part-time RN's, 4.0 per 100 beds, and the West ranked second with 2.9. Although the South had the lowest rates of RN's, it had the highest rate of full-time LPN's (5.6 per 100 beds). With the exception of the Northeast, all regions had more LPN's than RN's per 100 beds.

When rates for full-time equivalent (sum of full-time employees plus part-time employees divided by 2) RN's were added to those for full-time equivalent LPN's, the Northeast had the highest rate, 12.0 nurses per 100 beds; the West was second with a rate of 11.5; the South had 9.3; and the North Central had 8.6. A possible explanation for the North Central low rate might be that nursing homes in the North Central Region utilized some other means to obtain nurses, such as contract. Data from the 1977 National Nursing Home Survey, which included contracted nurses, tended to substantiate this hypothesis. In that survey the Northeast ranked the highest with a nurse rate of 14.3 per 100 beds, followed by the South with a nurse rate of 10.0 per 100 beds, the West with a nurse rate of 9.9, and the North Central with a nurse rate of 9.7 per 100 beds.<sup>6</sup> Another explanation might be that many of the

homes in the North Central Region are residential facilities. Generally, these facilities do not have nurses because their residents are in fairly good health and are independent.

### Table 23

From the 15,840 homes that reported inpatient days (out of 17,819), 419,053,354 days of care were provided to patients in nursing homes. Homes in the North Central Region provided the most days of care (154,404,474 inpatient days). Homes in the South Region ranked second (139,383,315 inpatient days).

### Table 24

The occupancy rate for nursing homes was 91 percent. In five States (Connecticut, 96; Hawaii, 97; South Carolina, 96; South Dakota, 96; North Dakota, 96), more than 95 percent of nursing home beds were occupied by residents in nursing homes. Even the State with the lowest occupancy rate (Texas) was higher than 79 percent.

### Table 25

According to the 14,518 homes (out of 17,819 nursing homes) that reported data on admissions and discharges for the year 1981, turnover rates (admissions per beds and discharges per beds) were higher for the medium size nursing homes (50–299 beds) than either the small or the large homes. These rates were also higher for proprietary homes and homes in the West.

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# Appendix I

## Technical notes

All of the National Master Facility Inventory (NMFI) surveys (of nonhospitals) through 1973 were conducted by the National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) with the assistance of the U.S. Bureau of the Census. The Cooperative Health Statistics System (CHSS) was active from 1976 to 1980. This system decentralized the responsibility for collecting data from the Federal to the State level. In 1976, 16 States within CHSS collected some or all of the NMFI data. In 1978 there were 26 States, and in 1980 there were 38 States collecting NMFI data. In each of these years, NCHS surveyed in the non-CHSS States.

Although CHSS was not active in 1982, arrangements were made with 36 States (Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Illinois, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia, Wisconsin, and Wyoming) plus the District of Columbia to obtain their data. A number of these State surveys did not include every type of nursing and related care home that NCHS includes in its universe. Where this occurred, NCHS surveyed those homes excluded from the State's survey.

The agency within the CHSS States that collected the NMFI data for NCHS was usually the licensing agency. There were differences in definition, scope, and timing of the surveys among CHSS States because State survey coverage was structured according to licensing laws. Whereas NCHS surveys included such facilities as personal care homes, homes for the aged, and rest homes, some States did not license these types of homes and, therefore, did not survey them.

For States that were surveyed by NCHS, a mailing list was compiled by merging the following two files: The final inventory of facilities from the 1980 NMFI Survey and a list of new facilities gathered through the Agency Reporting System.<sup>7</sup> The resulting list is then matched against the latest (1980 NMFI) listing to locate new facilities.

Although the 1980 NMFI Survey was a universe rather than a sample survey, and hence not subject to sampling error, it is subject to other types of errors, such as nonresponse to questionnaire items. To minimize nonresponse items as well as

overall nonresponse, NCHS used a two-part procedure in States that were surveyed. The first part uses a series of follow-ups to reduce overall nonresponse. This procedure included (as needed) a postcard reminder, two questionnaire followups, and an abbreviated questionnaire (see appendix II) to responding facilities that failed to answer certain critical items on the initial questionnaire. Facilities were asked to complete only those critical items originally left blank.

The following imputations were made to the 1982 NMFI data:

- 1980 data were used for approximately 500 nursing homes in New York.
- Little or no data were available for the 4,985 California residential community care facilities, or for the 2,243 Michigan adult foster care homes. Although a number of these facilities served only the mentally ill or mentally retarded, there was not enough information available to identify and remove them. As a result, all residential community care facilities and adult foster care homes were kept, and beds and residents were imputed using 1980 averages.
- No resident or employee data were available for the 429 Florida adult congregate living facilities or the 373 Kentucky family care homes. Total residents were imputed by multiplying beds by 0.90 (the average occupancy rate for nursing homes).
- Registered nurse and licensed practical nurse data were imputed for Florida and Connecticut using 1980 data.
- In four States (Alaska, Minnesota, Montana, and Texas) the highest resident age group was 75 years and over. Estimates for residents 85 years and over in these States were obtained by subtracting 50 percent from the 75 years and over age group and adding the result to the 85 years and over group.
- The estimate of 1,204,356 nursing home residents 65 years and over was derived by applying percents in known age distributions within each region to the residents in each region whose ages were unknown. Almost 866,000 residents were actual counts, while the remaining 338,000 were imputed.
- Some States issue a nursing home license and a residential license for the same facility. Whenever this occurred, it created duplicate homes but not duplicate beds. Every effort has been made to eliminate this duplication of homes in such situations.



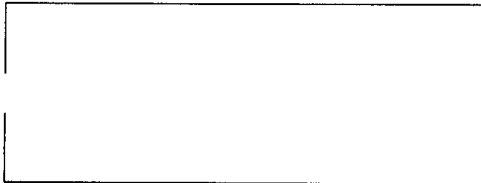

# Appendix III

## Definitions of certain terms used in this report

### Types of homes

*Nursing homes*—Facilities with three or more beds that provide to adults who require it either (a) nursing care or (b) personal care (such as help with bathing, correspondence, walking, eating, using the toilet, or dressing) and/or supervision over such activities as money management, ambulation, and shopping. Facilities providing care solely to the mentally retarded and mentally ill are excluded.

*Residential facilities*—Facilities with no nursing services that provide only personal care or supervisory care. For purposes of this report, only those residential facilities in Florida, Michigan, Kentucky, and California are included under this heading. (NOTE: Facilities meeting this definition also exist in the other 46 States, but because they cannot be identified precisely as residential, they appear in the counts of nursing homes.)

- *Adult congregate living facilities (Florida)*—These provide housing, food services, and one or more personal services to four or more adults not related to the owner.
- *Adult foster care homes (Michigan)*—Facilities that provide ongoing supervision, but not continuous nursing care, to adults who are aged, emotionally disturbed, developmentally disabled, or physically handicapped.
- *Family care homes (Kentucky)*—Facilities that are licensed but not certified. They generally have either two or three beds. (Those with two beds are out of scope for the National Master Facility Inventory and have been removed.)
- *Residential community care facilities (California)*—Facilities providing nonmedical care and supervision to the elderly, and to children who are either mentally disordered, developmentally disabled, or physically handicapped.

### Characteristics of homes

*Ownership*—Type of organization that controls and operates the nursing home. Proprietary homes are operated under private commercial ownership; nonprofit homes are operated

under voluntary or nonprofit auspices, which may or may not be church related; government ownership refers to homes operated under Federal, State, or local government auspices.

*Resident*—A person who has been formally admitted to but not discharged from a nursing home. All such persons were included in the survey whether or not they were physically present at the time of the survey.

*Admissions*—Total number of inpatients admitted during 1981.

*Discharges*—Total number of inpatients discharged (including deaths) during 1981.

*Bed*—For this report, a bed that is set up and staffed for use.

*Employees*—Number of full-time and part-time employees who work in the facility. This will include owners, managers, teaching staffs, research workers, staffs of outpatient facilities or extended care units, temporarily absent employees, trainees (if on the payroll), and members of religious orders whether paid or unpaid. Employees working 35 hours per week or more were classified as full-time; those working less than 35 hours were classified as part-time.

*Geographic regions*—The U.S. Bureau of the Census groups the 50 States plus the District of Columbia into the following four regions:

1. *Northeast Region*—Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania.
2. *North Central Region*—Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas.
3. *South Region*—Delaware, Maryland, District of Columbia, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas.
4. *West Region*—Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, Nevada, Washington, Oregon, California, Alaska, Hawaii.

### **Hospital-based and nonresponding homes**

Hospital-based and nonresponding homes were not shown in previous tables of this report. The skilled nursing facilities and intermediate care facilities that serve only the mentally ill or mentally retarded are not included in figures shown in table I.
