- b. Segmental only part of the body is in contact with the vibrating medium and the bulk of the body rests on a stationary surface.

### INCLUDES:

- a. Any work condition or situation that causes the worker's body to vibrate or shake.
- b. Any response that specifies vibration, shaking, or bouncing.
- c. Physical stress from vibration.
- d. Any work position that is uncomfortable due to vibration.

### **EXAMPLES:**

# 14 IMPROPER LIGHTING

- c. Unspecified glare.

- b. Being thrown against objects by the force of a explosion.

#### INCLUDES ALSO:

- a. Lacerations, cuts or bruises where the source of injury is explosion.
- b. Puncture wounds where the source of injury is explosion.

### EXAMPLES OF RESPONSES:

- "Boiler could blow up"
- "Bomb threat"
- "Explosion"
- "Gas line breakage"

### 30 ASPHYXIATION

A state of decreased amount of oxygen and increased amount of carbon dioxide in the body as a result of some interference with respiration.

# INCLUDES INJURIES FROM:

- a. Being in a confined space without air.
- b. Carbon monoxide poisoning
- c. Smoke filled air in a fire

#### **EXAMPLES OF RESPONSES:**

"Afraid I won't get any air to breathe when in the tank."

**EXCLUDE:** 

Drowning, code 28.

### 31 LACERATIONS, CUTS OR BRUISES

Injuries that result from edged, cutting or blunt objects which cause superficial cuts and bruises, or serious lacerations or cuts excluding amputation.

- b. Lacerations, cuts or bruises where the source of injury is NOT cod able to one of the codes listed in "c," below
