A brief summary of the contents for each section is listed below for the convenience of the reader. A complete table of contents is shown at the beginning of each section and is identified by a narrow black edge which can be located easily by fanning the pages. Each section is paged independently, using the section number as the identifying prefix.

Section 1. Marriages—Analysis and Summary

Text discussion of trends and differences between population groups; tables containing percent distributions, measures of central tendency and of variation; national, regional, and State rates; and charts.

Section 2. Marriages—Characteristics

Frequency tabulations by major demographic characteristics of bride and of groom and by characteristics of the marriage performed, for the United States, each region, the marriage-registration area, and each participating State.

Section 3. Divorces—Analysis and Summary

Text discussion of trends and differences between population groups; tables containing percent distributions; measures of central tendency and of variation; national, regional, and State rates; charts.

Section 4. Divorces—Characteristics

Frequency tabulations by major demographic characteristics of husband and wife and by characteristics of the divorce or annulment granted, for the United States, each region, the divorce-registration area, and each participating State.

Section 5. Marriages and Divorces, Each State and County

Annual totals of marriages performed and of divorces and annulments granted for each State and county or county equivalent.

Section 6. Marriages and Divorces—Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands

Marriage and divorce trends and totals by county or county equivalent; frequency tabulations of marriages by major characteristics of bride and groom; for the Virgin Islands only, frequency tabulations of divorces and annulments by characteristics of the decrees and of the husband and wife.

Section 7. Technical Appendix

Discussion of the historical and contemporary sources of marriage and divorce statistics, the design of the 1960 samples of marriages and of divorces and annulments, the uniformity and completeness of the collected data, and the variability of sample estimates. Tables contain lists of data sources, sample specifications, estimates of sampling variability and completeness of reporting of data, and population data used in computing marriage and divorce rates.

Section 8. Subject Index

Consolidated indexes of the text and statistical tables in this volume.

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Sampling Variability of the 1960 Marriage Statistics

The following statements are essential to understanding the limitations and uses of the small numbers in those tables in Sections 1 and 2 which are based on data from probability samples of marriage records. The headnote to each such table includes "Based on sample data."

For national, regional, and marriage-registration area statistics: Sampling errors are shown in tables 7-8, 7-9, and 7-11 in the Technical Appendix. In order to reflect more clearly general patterns of relationships and to retain the convenience of numbers which add to marginal totals, data tables contain some individual small numbers which convey very limited information because the sampling error is so large.

For registration State statistics: Sampling errors are shown in table 7-11. In order to reflect more clearly general patterns of relationships and to retain the convenience of numbers which add to marginal totals, data tables contain some individual small numbers which convey very limited information because the sampling error is so large. It is suggested that for any number less than those shown in the column "minimum useful statistic" the interpretation be simply "small" rather than any more precise value.

The rule for selection of these minimum useful statistics is based on an argument that for statistics as small as 1 percent of the total for a State a relative error of up to about 60 percent can be tolerated with 95 percent confidence. This is a "central tendency rule" and there will, of course, be some deviation from it. Further, the figure of 10 observations rather than, say, 12 is shown because of somewhat greater convenience in presenting and interpreting the minimum useful number.

SECTION 1. MARRIAGES—ANALYSIS AND SUMMARY

Highlights

There were 1,523,000 marriages in the United States in 1960; the rate per 1,000 population of 8.5 was the lowest annual rate since 1920 except for 1932 and 1958.

Marriage rates per 1,000 population by region were highest during the period 1956-60 in the West and South and lowest in the Northeast.

During 1953-60 monthly marriage totals for the United States showed some fluctuations when adjusted for seasonal variation, but no definite trend was observed. The large fluctuations of the seasonal component in the monthly marriage totals for 1953-60 were shown by an average monthly percentage change of 19.3 as compared with an average monthly percentage change of only 2.5 in the same totals after adjustment for seasonal variation.

For the 16 States reporting age at marriage and marriage order for each year since 1951, median age of brides at first marriage declined from 21.4 years in 1951 to 20.1 years in 1960 and for grooms from 23.8 in 1951 to 23.1 in 1960. Most of this decline resulted from increases in the percentages of brides and grooms married at ages under 20. For the same States the percentage of first marriages remained constant during this period for both brides and grooms.

Monthly totals of marriages received from the registration areas were highest in June in each region and in 44 of the 50 States. When compared with couples marrying for the first time, according to estimates based on samples of marriage records, brides and grooms who remarried did so more often in the last quarter of the year and less often in June (although June is the peak month for both groups).

For the United States as a whole, 47 percent of all marriages in 1960 occurred on Saturday and 72 percent occurred during the 3-day period Friday through Sunday.

For the marriage-registration area (MRA), 82 percent of the first-married brides and their partners and of first-married grooms and their partners married in their States of residence; corresponding percentages for those who remarried were 77 percent for brides and 76 percent for grooms. Ten percent of the first-married brides and grooms were nonresidents marrying nonresident partners, as were 16 percent of both brides and grooms who remarried.

Relatively more brides and grooms who married within their counties of residence were under age 25 at marriage, while more of those who married outside their States and regions of residence were of older ages.

In the marriage-registration area, 59 percent of all married couples resided in the county where the marriage was performed, and 14 percent of the brides and 5 percent

of the grooms were married in their counties of residence to nonresident spouses. Nine percent of all couples were both residents of the State but not the county in which they married; 11 percent were both nonresidents of the State in which they married.

In the United States, the mean age at marriage was 25.4 for all brides and 28.7 for all grooms. In the MRA, brides 20 years of age or under most often married grooms 1 to 3 years older; those 21 through 54 years of age most frequently married grooms in the same age group as themselves; and those 55 years and over most often married grooms older than themselves.

Among couples marrying for the first time, the median ages of grooms who married brides 18-24 were higher by approximately 2 to 4 years than those of their spouses; median ages of grooms with spouses 25 through 54 years were higher than the midpoints of the five age intervals in this age span by about the same number of years (table 1-N). By contrast, the number of years by which ages of grooms exceeded the median ages of their brides increased markedly from about 1 year for grooms who were 20 years old at marriage to 5 years or more for grooms in the oldest age intervals.

The age-specific marriage rates for 1960 per 1,000 unmarried women in the United States varied from 2.9 for those 65 years and over to 284.7 for those 20-24 years; the rates per 1,000 unmarried men varied from 16.7 for those 65 years and over to 218.3 for those 20-24 years.

The older the age at marriage the greater the excess of the age-specific marriage rate per 1,000 unmarried men over the corresponding rate per 1,000 unmarried women.

In the MRA marriage rates per 1,000 unmarried women 14 years of age and over were 64.1 for all brides, 63.6 for white brides, and 63.4 for nonwhite brides. For all grooms and for white and nonwhite grooms, the rates were 75.0, 74.6, and 72.0, respectively. Age-specific rates of brides and of grooms at first marriage were lower for nonwhites than for whites at ages 18-29, but higher for nonwhites than for whites at ages under 18 and 30 years and over. Overall, rates for remarriages were higher for nonwhite than for white grooms but approximately equal for brides. Remarriage rates among both the widowed and divorced were higher for grooms than for brides except for the divorced group aged 14-24. The higher marriage rates per 1,000 unmarried women or men 14 years and over in several MRA States were accounted for in part by large proportions of marriages of nonresident brides and grooms.

Distributions of age at marriage of brides and grooms varied markedly by previous marital status (single, widowed, or divorced). In terms of 5-year age groups and with under 20 years and 65 years and over as the lower and upper limits,

the largest number of single brides were under 20 years of age and of single grooms were 20-24 years. The greatest number of divorced persons of both sexes were 25-29 years, and the greatest number of those widowed were brides 45-49 years and grooms 65 years and over.

For the reporting States, the percentages of all brides (18.1) and of all grooms (17.5) who married for the second time were approximately equal as were those of all brides (3.9) and of all grooms (3.7) for whom the number of this marriage was three or more.

For the MRA, excluding Ohio, the percents of civil ceremonies for first-married brides (16.4) and grooms (17.3) were slightly less than one-half of the corresponding percents for remarried brides (38.4) and grooms (36.1).

Sources of data

The year 1960 was a landmark in the development of marriage registration and marriage statistics in the United States. Data were based on a sample of marriage transcripts selected according to probability sampling procedures and processed in the National Vital Statistics Division. Detailed information on the design of the sample, sampling errors, and estimates of completeness of data for 1960 as well as comparisons of 1960 data collection procedures with those of preceding years are shown in Section 7, the Technical Appendix.

The sample was designed to give information on estimates of total marriages and to give statistical data about the marriage, the bride, and the groom for the United States, each of the four regions, the marriage-registration area, and each registration State. Several national and regional statistical tabulations are being shown for the first time. Reports of the numbers of marriages were presented for the years preceding 1960 on a monthly and annual basis for the Nation as a whole, the nine geographic divisions, and each State as well as annual totals for nearly all of the counties. Based on sample transcripts, the national and regional statistics for 1960 consist of marriages by month, by day of week, and by age at marriage of bride and groom. Three other variables—marriage order, marital status, and color—are also shown for the United States as a whole but with larger proportions of incomplete data as indicated in tables 7-13 and 7-14 of the Technical Appendix. Marriage order (first or remarriage) of bride and of groom was reported for the United States, with almost 12 percent not stated. About 70 percent of these not stated cases were from reporting areas in which information for classifying first-married and remarried persons was not available from any of the sample records. Information on the marital status of each partner at the time of marriage was not stated on 14 percent of all sample records for the United States, and color was not stated on 16 percent. Items shown for the United States as a whole were more completely reported for the marriage-registration area. For all items except color, which was 9 percent, less than 5 percent were not stated. Among the four regions, reporting was most complete in the Northeast. The proportion of not stated exceeded 15 percent for color in the North Central and West, for marriage order in the South, and for previous marital status in

the North Central and South. Data on color were not available from a few reporting areas in the North Central and West Regions; data on marriage order and previous marital status were not available from a few areas in every region except the Northeast. All estimates of incompleteness are presented in tables 7-13 and 7-14, Section 7.

Each estimate based on sample data has a sampling error arising from the fact that the estimate varies somewhat each time a sample is drawn from all records of 1960 marriages. These sampling errors are shown in tables 7-8, 7-9, and 7-11.

Overall, the data are more complete for 1960 than for previous years, even though some work remains to be done to secure completeness of reporting and uniformity in the items appearing on marriage records, chiefly from areas now outside the MRA.

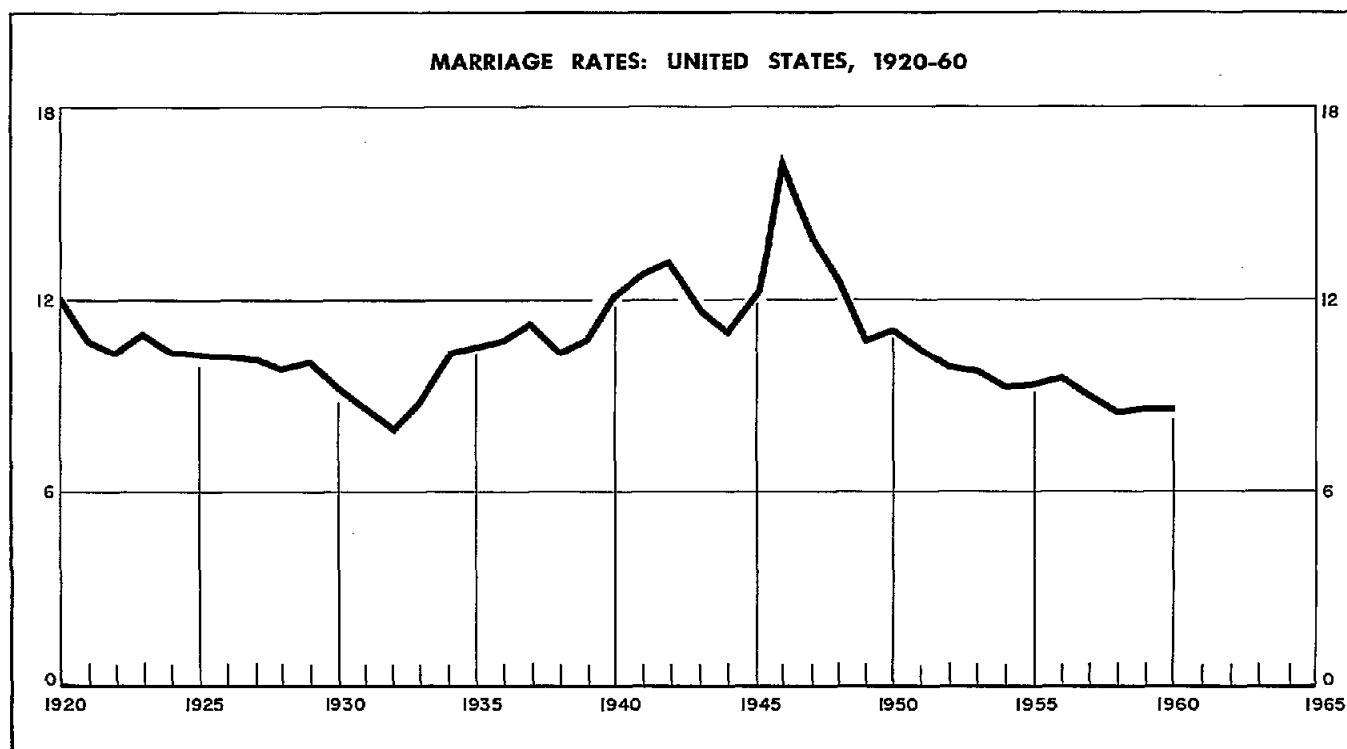
Marriage trends

In 1960 marriages in the United States totaled 1,523,000, with a rate per 1,000 population of 8.5. This annual rate, as well as those for 1958 and 1959, was among the lowest since 1920; only the rates for 1931, 1932, and 1933 were comparable in level (table 1-A and fig. 1-1). To a marked extent the low rates of recent years reflect the low birth rates of the 1930 decade, the marked increases in birth rates thereafter, and the resulting relatively small proportions of young adults in the marriageable ages in 1960. When adjusted for under-registration, the fertility rate declined from 89.3 in 1929 to 75.8 in 1936; the 1929 rate was not exceeded until 1942 with a rate of 91.5. Men and women born in 1932, when the fertility rate was declining markedly, reached the age of 18, the youngest of the peak marriage ages (approximately 18-24), in 1950; those born in 1941 will reach the oldest of these ages, 24, in 1965. Hence throughout the 16-year period 1950-65, and particularly from about 1955 to 1960, the overall marriage rate is lowered due partly to the earlier low birth rates. The influence of the small number of persons in these ages on the trend of nonspecific marriage rates may also be seen by comparing the rate trend in table 1-A with the trend of the rate per 1,000 unmarried females 15 years of age and over shown in table 1-B. The latter rate (73.5) which was based more precisely on the female population eligible for marriage was slightly higher than the low of 72.0 in 1958. The level of this rate was higher in 1960 than in every year of the 1930 decade except 1936 and 1937.¹

Trends in rates during the 5-year period 1956-60 (table 1-D) show more variation for any one area than do rates among these areas for any one year. For example, the rate for the West Region varied only from 9.5 to 11.1, but the rate among the regions in 1960 varied from 7.0 to 9.8. For each year the highest rates were found in the South and West Regions. Within the South, the highest rates were for

the South Atlantic Division, which includes the high marriage rate States of Maryland, South Carolina, and Georgia, and for the West South Central Division, with above average rates in two of its four States for 5 years and in one for 1959 and 1960. In the West the extremely high rate for Nevada stands out; five of the remaining seven Mountain States and Washington had rates above the national average, to some extent because of high proportions of their populations being in the marriageable ages. Marriage rates were low in the Northeast Region, but New Hampshire stands out with rates about 40 percent above the national average.

As a group, States in the marriage-registration area have had rates below the national average since the beginning of the MRA in 1957 (table 1-A). The rates for the United States for the years 1957 through 1960 were 8.9, 8.4, 8.5, and 8.5, respectively; corresponding rates for the MRA were 8.2, 7.7, 7.7, and 7.2. Nevada, South Carolina, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, and Washington had rates above the national average but do not yet participate in the marriage-registration area.

Marriage figures unadjusted for seasonal variation included a strong seasonal factor with the largest totals and rates in June, secondary peaks in August and September, and seasonal lows during the first 3 months of each year (table 1-C). When these monthly marriage figures are seasonally adjusted (table 1-C), the longer-term trends

become more evident—a decline from 1953 through 1954 followed by slight increases until early 1957, then a decline and levelling off through 1959 followed by some increase through 1960. Overall, the seasonally adjusted figures showed no pronounced upward or downward trend during these years. Figure 1-2 shows these trends of the rate per 1,000 females 15-44 years of age.

Trends in marriages classified by certain characteristics of brides and grooms (for example, age at marriage and marriage order) are available for an increasing number of States. Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, New Hampshire, New York (excluding New York City), Oregon, South Dakota, Tennessee, Vermont, Virginia, and Wyoming have reported both age at marriage and marriage order completely enough for the data on these variables to be published for each year beginning with 1951 (tables 1-T and 1-U). These 16 States are distributed among the four regions—5 of the 9 States in the Northeast are included but only 4 of 12 in the North Central, 4 of 17 in the South, and 3 of 13 in the West.

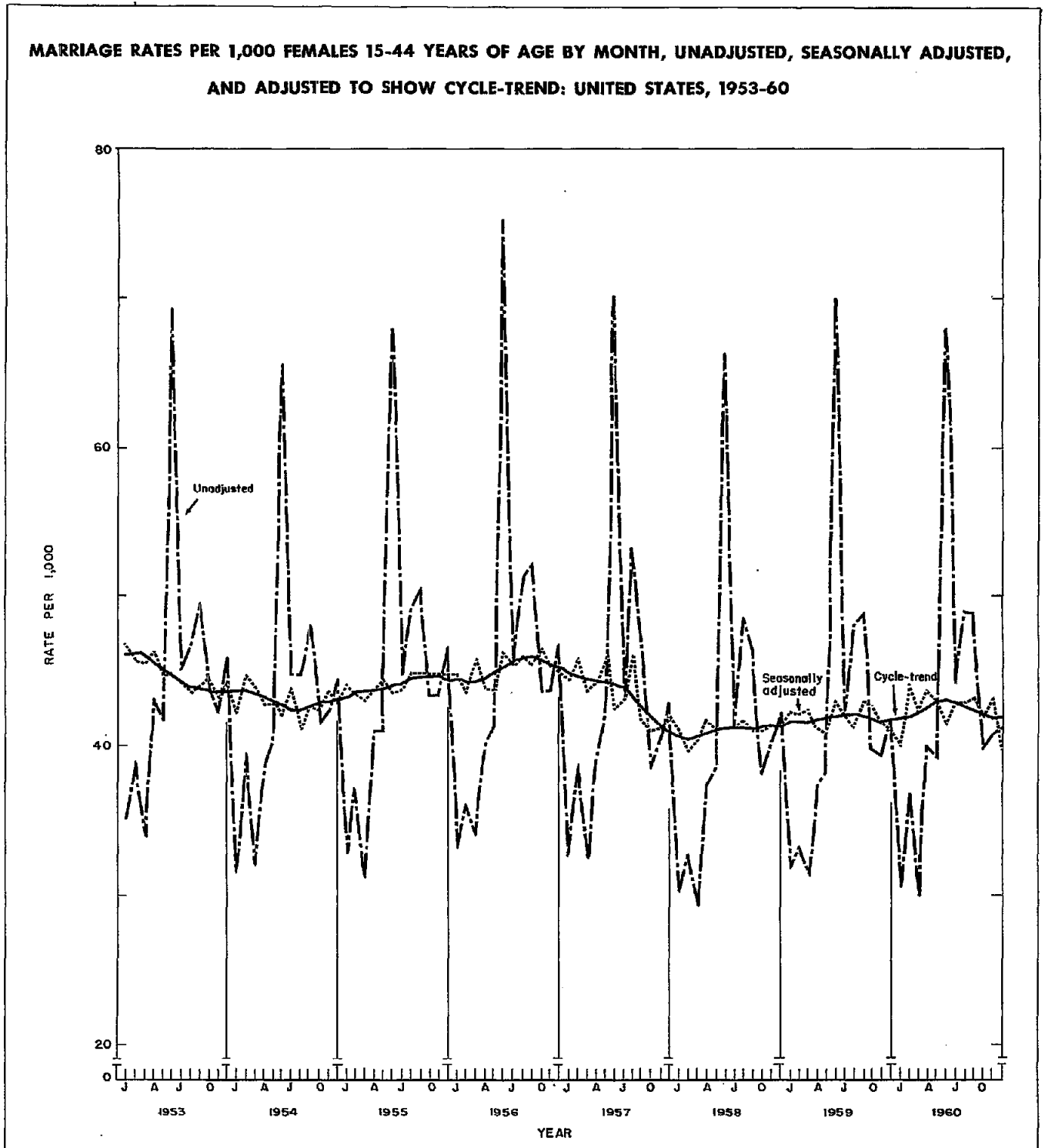
Comparisons of the age distributions for this group of States in 1960 with those shown for the United States (table 2-7 in Section 2) indicate small but probably significant excesses in the 16 States of brides under 20 years of age and grooms 20-24 along with deficiencies of brides aged

25-29 years and grooms 35-44 years. The comparative percents for all 1960 marriages are as follows:

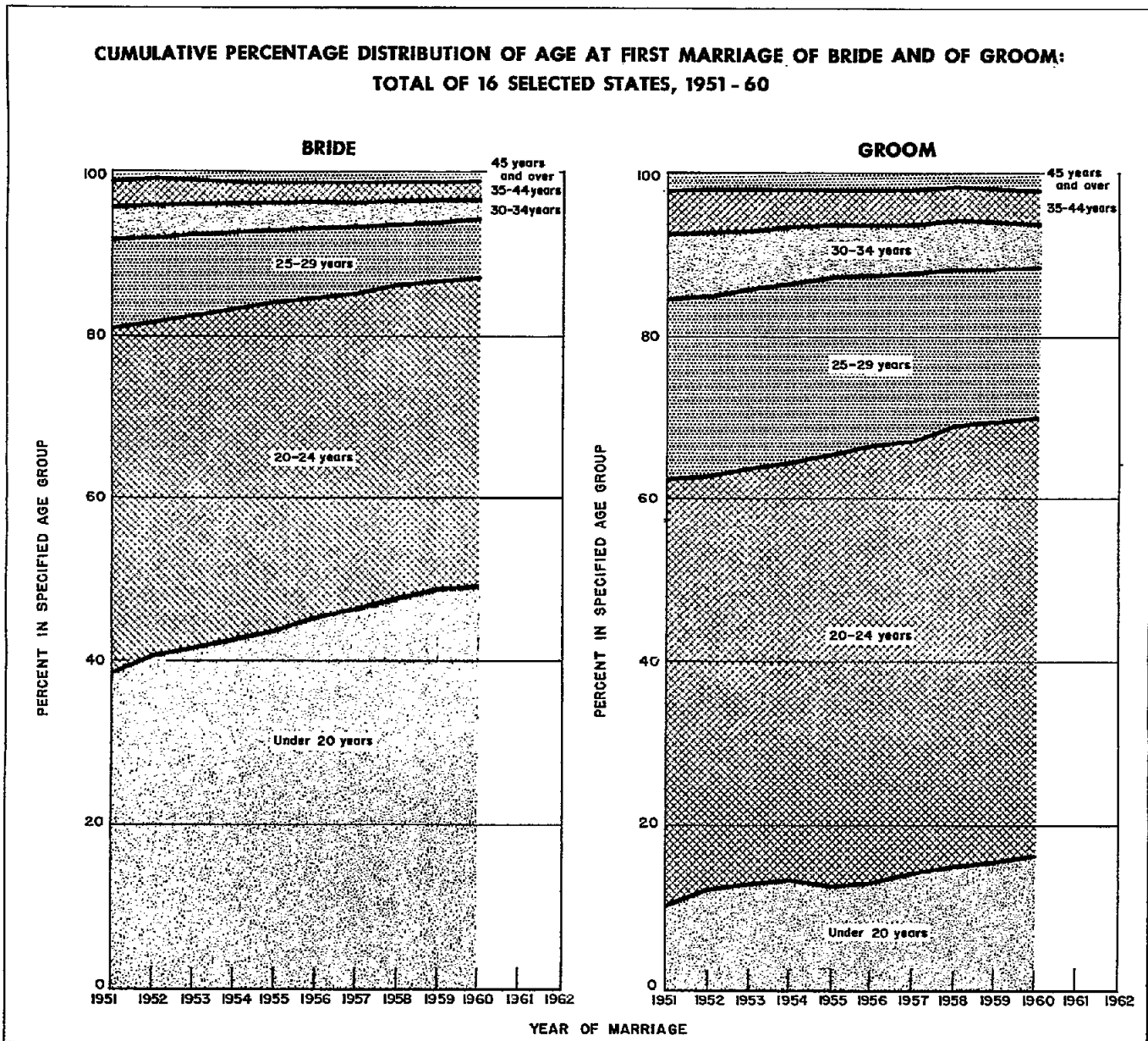


The outstanding trend in the percent distributions of age at marriage was toward higher percents of marriages of teenage brides and grooms. The percent of all brides under age 20 increased from 31 in 1951 to 39 in 1960; for grooms the increase was from 8 to 13 percent. This trend was more marked for first marriages. The percent of first-married brides under 20 years of age increased from 39 in 1951 to 49 in 1960, while that for grooms increased from 11 in 1951 to 17 in 1960. The trends in the proportions of brides and grooms in all other age groups were either declining or relatively uniform. Figure 1-3 shows these trends as changes in total age distributions. Influenced by the increases in proportions of brides and grooms under age 20, the median

age at marriage, or the age below which 50 percent of all brides married, declined from 22.6 years in 1951 to 21.6 years in 1960; the median age of grooms declined from 24.9 to 24.2 years. Median age of first-married brides decreased from 21.4 years in 1951 to 20.1 years in 1960; for first-married grooms the decline was from 23.8 years in 1951 to 23.1 years in 1960.

The trend in percent of all brides marrying for the first time for the 16 States from 1951 to 1960 (table 1-U) remained almost constant, varying by little more than one percentage point throughout the period. Percents of all grooms who married for the first time and of all brides and grooms who remarried also remained constant.

Trends by month.—The seasonal variation in monthly marriage totals in addition to a discussion of this variation in relation to trends may be summarized by a statistic termed average monthly amplitude, or average percentage change in each monthly figure of a series from the preceding monthly figure. A time series analysis of marriage totals and rates was carried out for the period January 1953-September 1961, yielding estimates of these average amplitudes for the original or unadjusted figures, the seasonal component or variation, the original figures after adjustment for seasonal variation, and two components of the seasonally adjusted series, the first showing cycles and trends of longer than 1 year's duration and the second showing irregular variations of less than 1 year's duration. These monthly percentage changes are:

These summary statistics indicate that the seasonal amplitude very nearly equalled the amplitude in the original data and that there were almost no cyclical or trend changes during these years.

Monthly totals of marriages (in five States, of marriage licenses issued) were reported by States and, in a few cases, by counties. In general, monthly totals as estimated from sample transcripts (tables 1-E and 1-F, and 2-3, 2-4, and 2-5 in Section 2) differ somewhat from those shown in table 2-1 of Section 2 because of differences in cutoff dates for reporting records and because of the inclusion in the sample processed in NVSD of those records of 1960 marriages which were received with 1961 transcripts.

The seasonal distributions of reported monthly totals (table 2-1, Section 2) were, in general, similar to those discussed previously under Marriage Trends. In most

regions and geographic divisions, June had the highest monthly totals of marriages and March the lowest. In the Northeast Region, September had the second highest totals, and in the North Central, South, and West, August was the second highest followed closely by December in the South and July in the West. In all States except six, June totals were highest. In many States March totals were lowest; Georgia, Tennessee, and most States in the West were exceptions. Highest monthly totals were reported for July in Nevada and New Hampshire, for August in Alaska and Idaho, for September in Rhode Island, and for December in South Carolina.

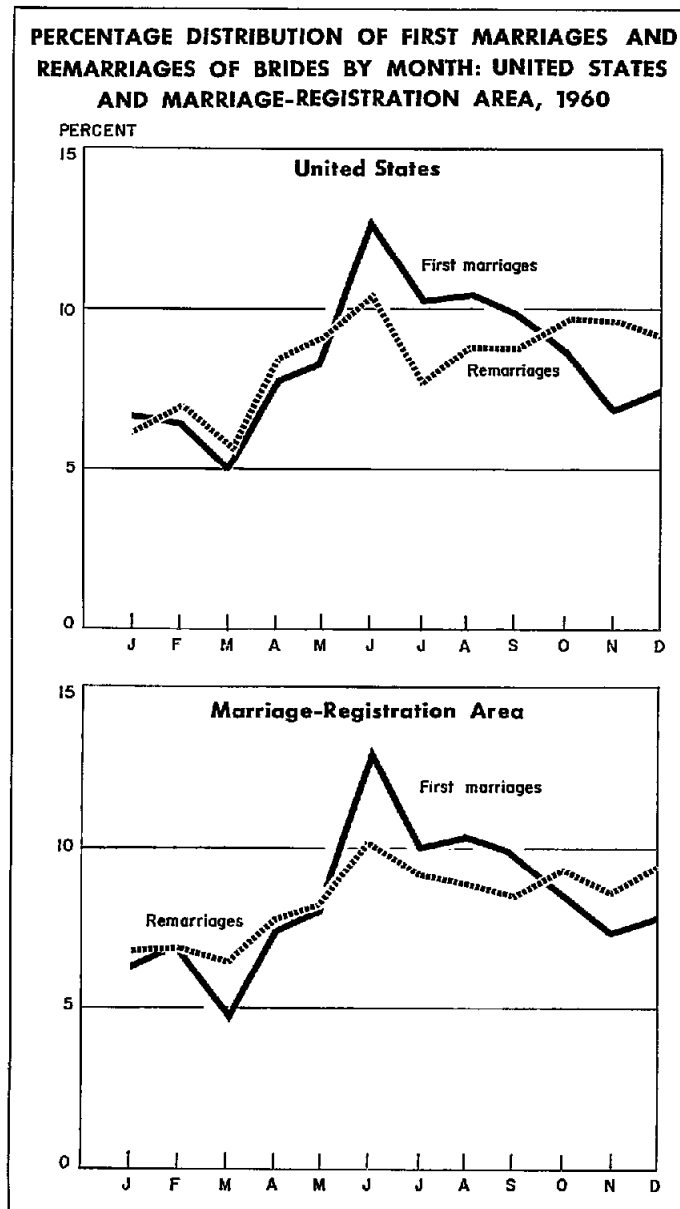
Demographic characteristics.—The percentage distributions by age shown for each month in table 1-E had no definite pattern. Relatively more of the younger brides and grooms and fewer older brides and grooms married in June. However, among June brides and grooms the teenagers were underrepresented; brides 20-24 and grooms 20-29 were best represented. The oldest ages, 45 years and over, were found in highest proportions among brides marrying in October and grooms marrying in November.

Proportionate monthly distributions by marriage order and color of brides and grooms (table 1-F and fig. 1-4) indicated that June was a popular month for marriages in all categories, but relatively more brides and grooms who remarried chose 1 of the last 3 months of the year than was the case for those who married for the first time.

Differences in the monthly distributions of marriages of whites as compared with nonwhites were not uniform. These differences might be less complex, however, if regional variations were taken into account. When compared with white brides and grooms for the United States as a whole, nonwhite brides and grooms who married for the first time did so more frequently in January and March (and May for brides) and less frequently in the summer and early autumn (June through September). Among previously married brides and grooms, relatively more nonwhites remarried in February, April, June, November, and December, and fewer remarried in January and July through October. Most of these comparisons also apply to the entries for the MRA, except that percents of first-married brides in May are about equal, and that the order of the percents for the previously married is reversed for marriages occurring in June and October.

Weekly variation.—Estimates of the numbers of marriages performed on each day of the week during 1960 showed that 46.7 percent of all marriages occurred on Saturday. Among the regions these proportions were 62.1 percent in the Northeast, 55.7 in the North Central, 35.2 in the South, and 38.6 in the West. For the MRA the proportion occurring on Saturday was 52.3 percent, and according to the figures for the Nation, the MRA, and for each region except the Northeast (which had more marriages occurring on Sunday) the next most popular day for marriages was Friday and then Sunday. Taken as a group, marriages performed in 1960 on the 3 "weekend" days constituted 72.0 percent of all marriages in the United States and 76.6 percent in the MRA. Statistically, since the number of Saturdays (or of Fridays or Sundays) in any month of 29 days or more varies between four and five from year to year, the pronounced weekly cycles are a factor in the variation in totals for the same month of different years.

Analysis of residence data was limited by problems in allocating county of residence when only city or town was reported, as was the case for several States. If only city or town was reported, allocation was made to the county which included all or the largest proportion of the city or town population. Though the data on county of residence should be accepted with some caution, comparisons of the proportions of brides and grooms resident and not resident in county of marriage in 8 States reporting only city or town with those of other States in the MRA indicate that the variation in these distributions among the 8 States closely resembles the variation among the other 25 States.

Variations in the proportions of brides and grooms who married within or outside their counties and States of residence indicate the extent to which couples went into various States to marry; they also provide information about

differences, if any, in the demographic characteristics of resident and nonresident brides and grooms.

Data on resident status were available only for the States in the marriage-registration area. Tables 2-8, 2-9, 2-10, and 2-11 in Section 2 show these data as frequencies; in tables 1-G, 1-H, and 1-J the data are shown as percents.

About 699,000, or 81 percent, of the 868,000 marriages for which residence was reported were those of brides and grooms resident in the State in which they married. Eighty-two percent of both first-married brides and grooms were residents marrying resident spouses, as was the case for 77 percent of the brides and 76 percent of the grooms who had been previously married. Next in order of numbers and proportions were those couples with both spouses nonresidents—10 percent of the first-married brides and grooms and 16 percent of those previously married. For first marriages of either or both partners 7 percent of all grooms were nonresidents marrying resident brides, but only 2 percent of the brides were nonresidents marrying resident grooms. Corresponding proportions for grooms and brides in couples where one or both had been previously married were 5 and 3 percent, respectively.

Comparison of the distributions of age at marriage for four resident-status categories of brides and grooms (table 1-G) indicates no simple relationship of resident status and age at marriage. Among brides marrying in their county of residence, 39 percent were under 20 years of age; but among brides marrying outside their region of residence, only 30 percent were under age 20. Corresponding percents for grooms were 15 and 10, respectively. Also, among the four categories of brides as well as of grooms, the percent 25 to 64 years of age was least among those resident in the county where they married. Residents included relatively large numbers of young brides and grooms and, correspondingly, somewhat smaller proportions of older brides and grooms.

Among all brides and grooms who had married previously, those who married in their county of residence included relatively more youths (under 20 for brides and under 25 for grooms). On the other hand, brides and grooms who were nonresidents of the counties and States in which they married were more often older (20-44 for brides and 25-64 for grooms). However, the brides and grooms who remarried in their counties of residence included more brides aged 45 or over and more grooms aged 65 or over than did those who remarried outside their counties of residence. In other words, brides and grooms who remarried in their home counties included relatively more of those in the youngest and oldest ages at marriage, whereas the ages in between were overrepresented among the nonresidents.

Fifty-nine percent of all couples were both residents of the county in which they married (table 1-H and table 2-10 in Section 2). Of the remainder, 9 percent lived in other counties in the same State, while in 11 percent of the cases both lived outside the State where married. The proportion of couples in which the bride resided in the county of marriage but the groom did not (14 percent) was about three times as large as the proportion in which the groom resided in the county of marriage but the bride did not (5 percent).

The proportion of couples with both partners residents of the State in which they married exceeded 90 percent in

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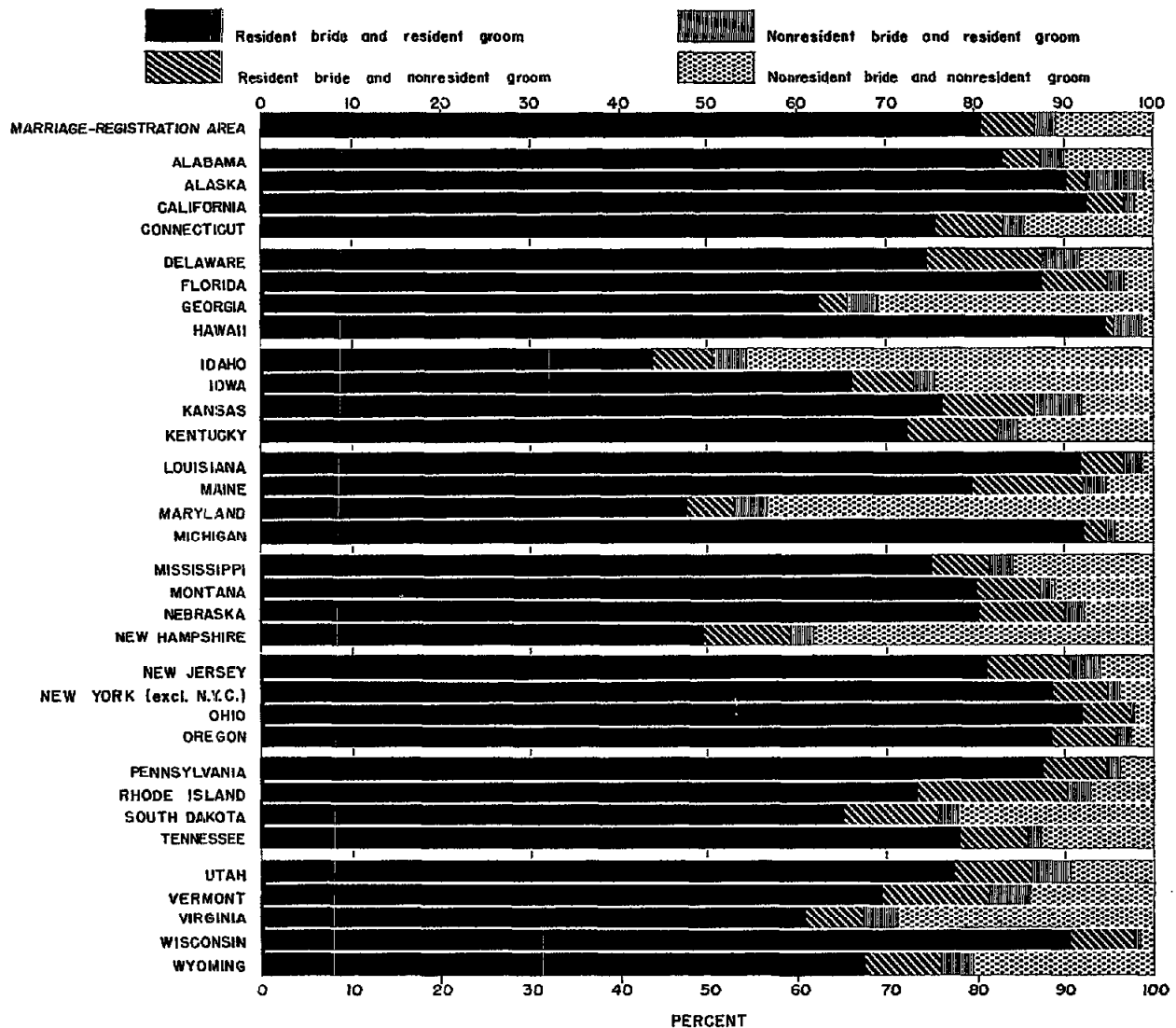
Alaska, California, Hawaii, Louisiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Wisconsin but was less than 50 percent in Idaho, Maryland, and New Hampshire (table 1-J and fig. 1-5). States in which the proportion of couples with both partners nonresident was more than twice the 11 percent for the MRA as a whole were Georgia, Idaho, Iowa, Maryland, New Hampshire, South Dakota, and Virginia.

Marriages and marriage rates by age, color, and marriage order of bride and of groom

Interrelationships of these key demographic variables are shown as frequency distributions in tables 2-6, 2-7, and 2-12 through 2-17 in Section 2 and as derived percents and rates in the analytical tables 1-K through 1-N and 1-P.

The mean age for all brides in 1960 was 25.4 years, while for grooms it was 28.7 years. Mean ages in each region varied only slightly from the nationwide figures—the greatest difference being in the West, where the mean ages at marriage were older (26.4 years for brides and 29.4 for grooms). For the MRA these age estimates—25.2 for brides and 28.4 for grooms—are fractionally lower than those for the Nation as a whole.

When ages of brides were classified by the ages of their grooms (table 2-12 in Section 2), relationships were found to be similar to those of previous years. For the MRA the modal age of grooms with brides under 18 years of age was 18; for those with brides 18-21 it was 21 years. Brides 22 and 23 years of age more often married grooms of the same ages, and those aged 24 years married grooms who were 25. For the ages above 25, partners of approximately the same age are characteristic, except that at the oldest age intervals (55 years and over for brides and 65 years and over for grooms) brides again characteristically marry grooms older than themselves.²

At the younger ages the age relationships were similar for whites and for nonwhites in the MRA (table 2-13 in Section 2). More brides under 20 years married grooms 20-24 rather than grooms under 20, and brides 20-24 and 25-29 most often married grooms in the same age interval. However, more nonwhite brides in the age groups 35-39 and 45-49 married grooms in older 5-year age groups than in their own, whereas the most frequent age combinations of white couples were in the same 5-year age groups. These data support in part a generalization that at ages 35 and over nonwhite brides marry older grooms more often than do white brides. Differences observed between whites and nonwhites may result from differences in economic status or educational level rather than in color, but data available for these tabulations did not permit multivariate analysis of such differences. The estimated numbers of white-nonwhite marriages in the MRA were so small as to be somewhat unreliable statistically, but they suggest, as shown below, that the age combinations of brides and grooms in such marriages were not markedly different from those found among marriage partners of the same color.

The most frequent age combinations of brides and grooms at first marriage of both (table 2-14 in Section 2) were, in general, similar to those for all marriages. Brides and grooms were most frequently approximately the same age except that brides aged 20 years or under more often married grooms 1 to 3 years older. Table 1-N (based on table 2-14) includes data which point up variations in mean and median ages of one partner as the age of the other varies. The analysis brings out the familiar characteristic of these combined age distributions that (except for the youngest and oldest brides) even though the most frequent or modal combinations were those of partners of approximately the same age, many more grooms were older than their brides. For

the United States, for example, the mean age of grooms with brides 21 years old was 24.2, but the mean age of brides with grooms 21 years old was 19.8 years. At the older ages these differences were even greater. The median and mean ages of brides with grooms in the age groups 45-54 and 55-64 were approximately 10 years younger than were the median and mean ages of grooms with brides in the corresponding age groups.

For the Nation as a whole, 75 percent of all brides and 76 percent of all grooms for whom marriage order was reported (i.e., 88 percent of all 1960 marriages) had not been previously married (table 1-K and fig. 1-6). The proportions were highest in the Northeast Region (84 percent for both brides and grooms) and lowest in the West (65 percent for brides and 69 for grooms). In the North Central and South Regions these proportions approximate those for the Nation. Among individual States in the MRA, most of the proportions of all brides and grooms marrying for the first time fell between 70 and 80 percent. Only Florida and four States in the West Region reported 70 percent or less. Delaware, Nebraska, Utah, Wisconsin, and six States in the Northeast Region reported 80 percent or more.

¹*United States and regions.*—For the United States in 1960, the marriage rate for females varied from 2.9 per 1,000 unmarried female population 65 years and over to 284.7 per 1,000 aged 20-24 years (table 1-L and fig. 1-7). Of the unmarried female population, 81 of every 1,000 aged 14-19 years married in 1960, 285 of 1,000 aged 20-24, 197 of 1,000 aged 25-29, 119 of 1,000 aged 30-34, 73 of 1,000 aged 35-44, and 19 of 1,000 aged 45-64.

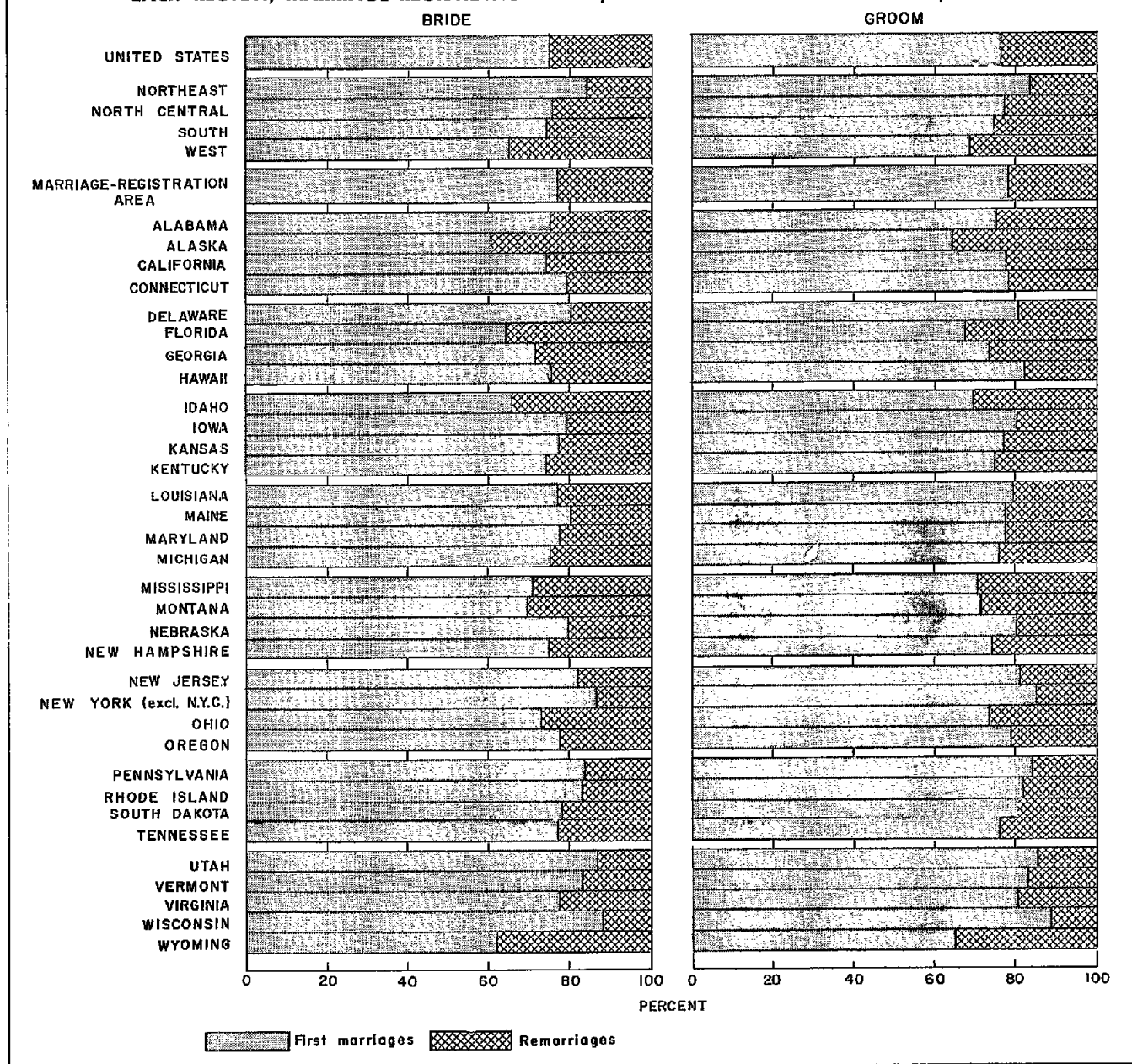
The highest rate per 1,000 unmarried men fell in the same age group (20-24 years) as for women, but the peak rate (218 per 1,000) was much lower than that for women. Beginning with the age group 25-29 years, however, rates

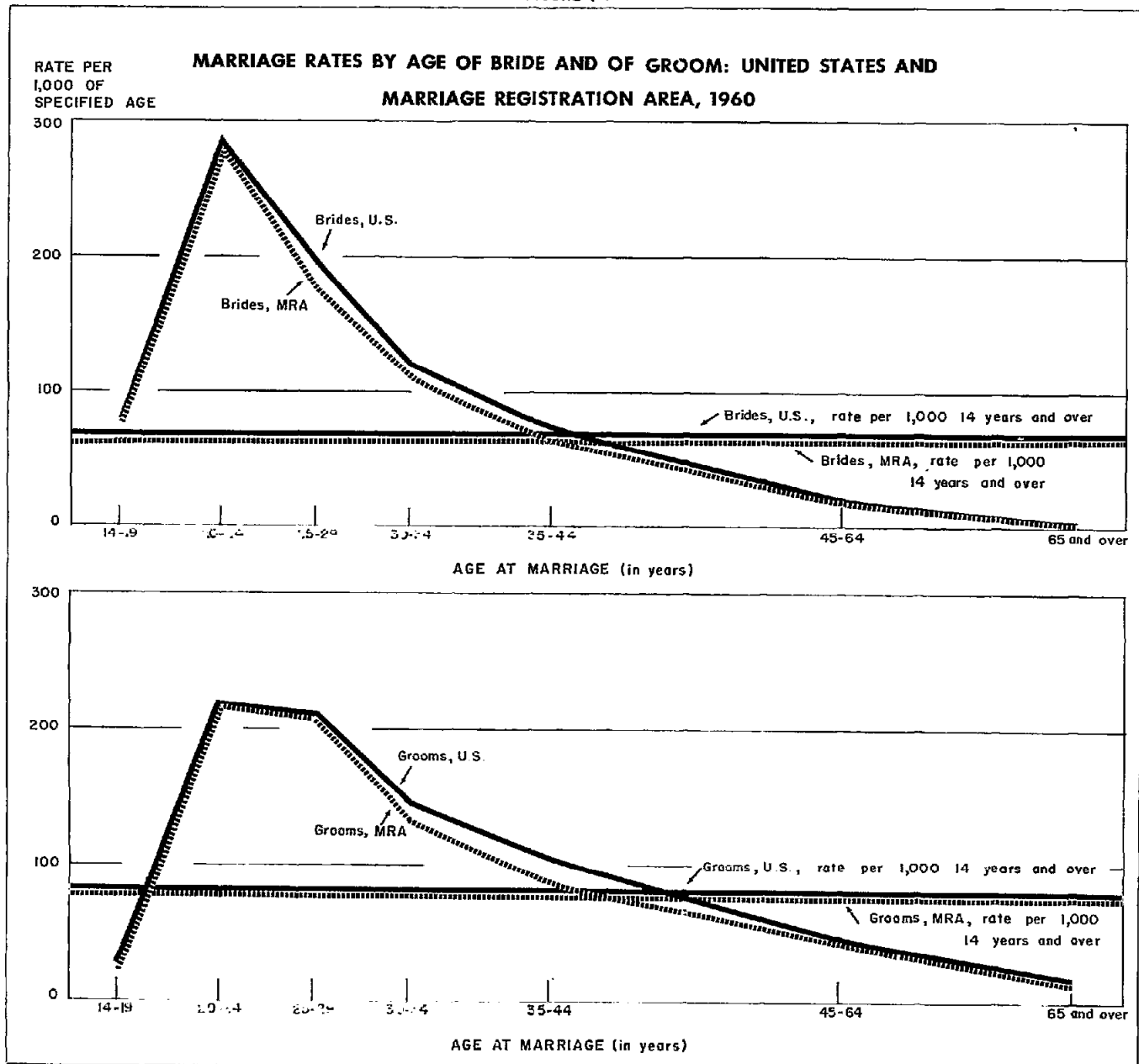
for men exceeded those for women by proportionally greater amounts until age 65 years and over when the rate per 1,000 unmarried men aged 65 and over (17) was over five times as large as that for unmarried women of the same age (3).

Among the regions, the rates were consistently lower in the Northeast. Rates for brides under age 25 were equally high in the South and West; above that age, however, the rates were clearly highest in the West, except for the age group 65 years and over, for which rates were equally

high in the North Central and South Regions. Rates for grooms aged 20-24 were equally high in the North Central and South Regions; for all other age groups, the highest rates were found in the South and West. Age-specific marriage rates for all brides and grooms for the United States (table 1-L) and the MRA (table 1-M) are compared graphically in figure 1-7.

Marriage-registration area.—These rates were not computed for the United States and each region because in-

formation on color, marriage order, and previous marital status was not available from a few reporting areas outside the MRA. However, the rates computed for the MRA as a whole show marked differences between the rates for men and those for women. For all marriages the rate for all unmarried men 14 years of age and over was 17 percent above the corresponding rate for unmarried women. Since, of course, the numbers of 1960 brides and grooms are equal, this difference in rates reflects the ratio of unmarried men to unmarried women in the MRA in 1960. The number of females in the unmarried population 14 years and over exceeded males by 17 percent; the corresponding percents for whites and nonwhites were 17 and 12, respectively. (These population figures are shown in tables 7-16 through 7-18 of

the Technical Appendix.) Rates for first marriages of all single women 14 years and over exceeded those for single men of the same ages by almost 23 percent for whites and 30 percent for nonwhites. As of 1960, the number of white single men 14 years of age and over exceeded the number of white single women of these ages by 26 percent; among nonwhites the corresponding figure was 30 percent.

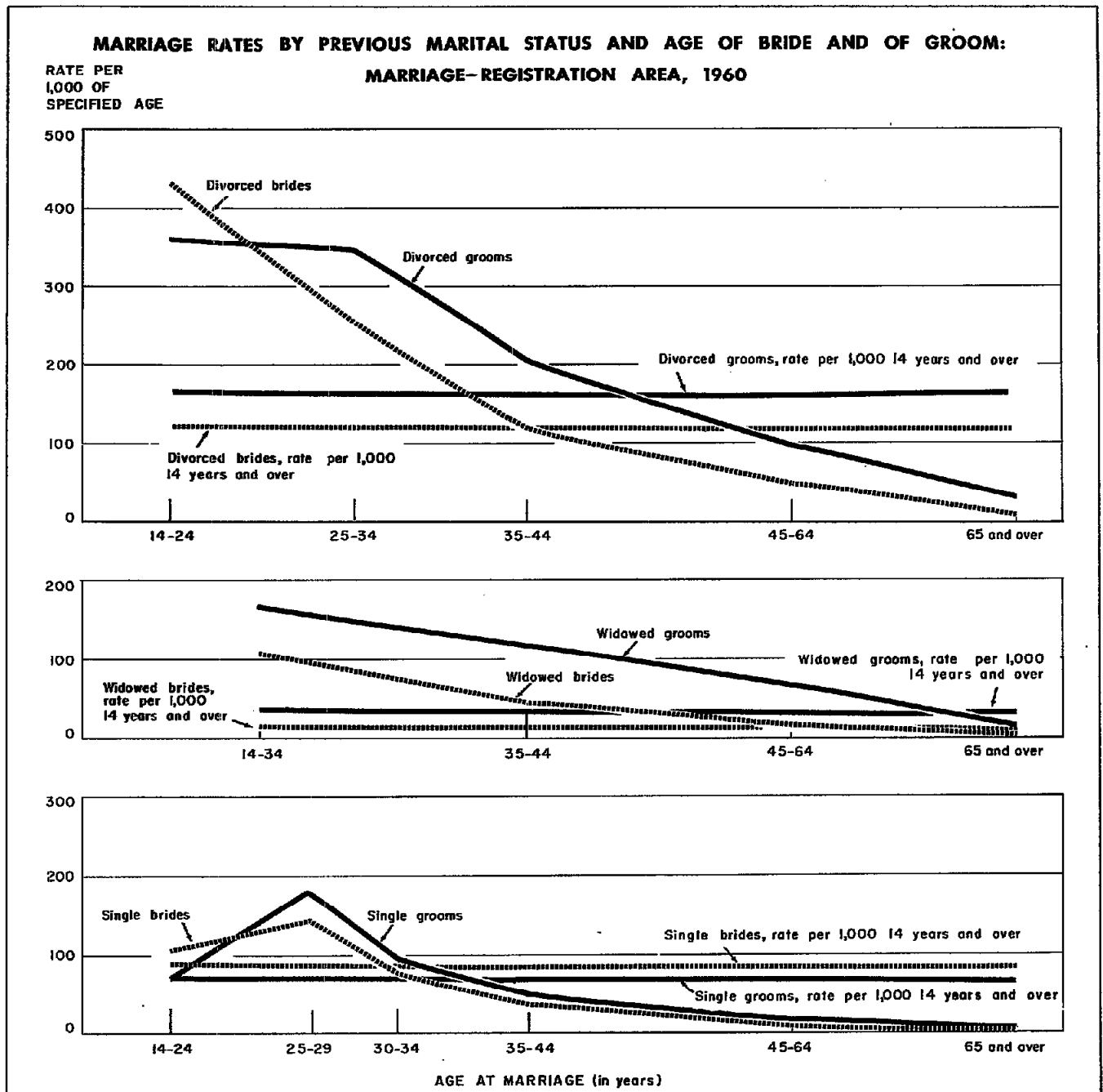
For both first-married brides and grooms, the 1960 rates were slightly higher for nonwhites than for whites 14-17 years of age, markedly higher for whites than for nonwhites at the ages from 18 through 29, but showed increasing difference in favor of nonwhites at ages 30 and over. These data indicate that first marriages occurred over a wider range of ages for nonwhite brides and grooms than for white.

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Computations based on population bases for 1960 (table 7-18) indicate that the ratios of single nonwhite men per 100 single nonwhite women were 156, 161, and 140 for the older ages 35-44, 45-64, and 65 years and older, whereas the corresponding ratios for single white men per 100 white women were 128, 97, and 73. If more nonwhite than white single men do not marry or postpone marriage, it seems probable that relatively more nonwhite than white single women would marry widowed or divorced men; this does indeed seem to be the case (table 2-21).

Remarriage rates for all currently unmarried men 14 years of age and over exceeded those for women by 172 percent. In the cases of widowed and divorced women who remarried, the rates for whites were above those for nonwhites at all ages except 45 and older. Rates for widowed and divorced men in 1960 were higher for whites than for nonwhites at ages 25 through 64, with the rates for nonwhites exceeding those for whites at ages 14-24 and 65 years and over.

In the light of the overall ratio in 1960 of 35 widowed and divorced men 14 years of age and over per 100 women in the same category, it seems likely that widowed and divorced men have more opportunities to marry than do women. Comparisons of age-specific marriage rates for single, widowed, and divorced brides and grooms are presented in figure 1-8.

Remarriage rates for grooms were markedly higher than those for brides (table 1-O) with the exception that the rate for divorced women under 25 years of age (433.4) was higher than that for the corresponding group of men (360.4). The older the brides and grooms at remarriage, the greater the relative excess of the rate for men over that for women. Among both the divorced and the widowed, the difference between the remarriage rate for nonwhite men and women was greater than that between white men and women. The remarriage rate for divorced nonwhite men (180.6) was 60 percent above the corresponding rate (112.6) for nonwhite women; the corresponding rate for white men (164.8) was 35 percent above the rate for white women (121.9). Among the widowed, the remarriage rate for men was about 3½ times the rate for women for both whites and nonwhites, but this difference was slightly larger for nonwhites.

Registration States.—The rates for all marriages per 1,000 unmarried women 14 years of age and over ranged from 47.3 in Pennsylvania to 158.7 in Idaho (table 1-P). The rate for Idaho was associated with an unusually high percent (45.5) of nonresident couples marrying in the State, relative to the 11 percent of couples in the entire MRA in 1960 who were not residents of the States in which their ceremonies occurred. In Georgia, Maryland, New Hampshire, and Wyoming with 31, 43, 38, and 20 percent respectively, of all marriages involving couples not resident in the State, the rates for all brides (102, 112, 92, and 108) and all grooms (126, 127, 111, and 93) were markedly above the MRA rates for all brides (69) and all grooms (77). Rates for these four States no doubt would be lower if their numerators were the numbers of resident brides and grooms, irrespective of place of marriage, since the base populations are resident in the State.

A few States with average or smaller proportions of nonresident marriages in the State had high marriage rates. The rates for all marriages in Utah (78.4 for women, 85.1 for men) were among the highest in those States with average and below average percents of nonresident marriages. Alaska and Montana also had high marriage rates among States not attracting unusually large proportions of marriages involving nonresident couples.

The age distribution of brides and grooms by marriage order and color for the MRA and each State shown in table 2-17 in Section 2 can be analyzed for a number of comparisons among two or more States. Since resident populations are available for 1960, rates specific by age and sex can be computed for such analyses, keeping in mind that their accuracy is greatest in those States with small proportions of nonresidents marrying in the State and of residents leaving the State to marry.

Previous marital status, age at marriage, and color of bride and of groom

While more complete than in earlier periods, the data on color and previous marital status were less completely reported than was the case for age, chiefly because information was not available from a few States and sample counties. (Estimates of incompleteness are shown in tables 7-13 and 7-14 of the Technical Appendix.) The data are presented as frequencies in tables 2-6 and 2-18 through 2-23 in Section 2. Age distributions for the United States are shown in table 2-6.

In terms of 5-year age groups, the modal ages in the MRA for brides were those under 25 years for the single, 45-49 years for the widowed, and 25-29 years for the divorced. These modal age groups for brides were the same for both whites and nonwhites in the MRA. The modal age groups for grooms in the MRA were under 25 years for the single, 65 years and over for the widowed, and 30-34 years for the divorced. These age groups were the same for both white and nonwhite single and widowed grooms, but the peak age groups for divorced grooms were 30-34 years for whites and 35-39 years for nonwhites.

Numbers of marriages of single, widowed, and divorced brides and grooms by color (table 2-23) for each MRA State, with summary figures for the MRA as a whole, can be used in comparing the proportions of single, widowed, and divorced brides and grooms in each color category among the States.

Numbers of marriages in which single and previously married brides married grooms in each marital status are shown below for marriages of whites to nonwhites. Numbers of marriages of white and nonwhite couples are shown in table 2-21.

There were relatively more marriages of single brides and grooms among whites than among nonwhites and also of couples in which both partners were divorced. On the other hand, the proportions were markedly greater among nonwhite than among white couples for combinations of single brides with widowed grooms and somewhat greater for those of single brides with divorced grooms, of widowed brides with single and with widowed grooms, and divorced brides with widowed grooms. Proportions of white and nonwhite couples were almost equal for widowed brides with divorced grooms and for divorced brides with single grooms.

Age distributions for brides and grooms of each combination of previous marital status are shown for the marriage-registration area in tables 2-18 through 2-20 and table 2-22, and age distributions for all brides and grooms are found in table 2-12 and for single partners in table 2-14. Age categories have been varied among the sections of each table, particularly at the youngest and oldest ages, in order to reduce the number of table entries with small and unreliable frequencies.

Distributions of brides and grooms by number of this marriage (i.e., first, second, third or more) are presented for the MRA and each State in table 2-24. Percentage distributions of brides and grooms by number of this marriage are shown in table 1-Q. For the MRA (excluding Idaho, Kansas, Maryland, and Oregon) 18.1 percent of brides and 17.5 percent of grooms married for the second time, while 3.9 percent of brides and 3.7 percent of grooms married for the third time or more. For brides and grooms marrying for the third time or more, percents for the States vary from 12.3 and 9.9 (Alaska), 11.2 and 7.8 (Wyoming), and 6.3 and 8.1 (Mississippi) to less than 1 percent for each in New York and Pennsylvania.

Civil and religious marriage ceremonies

Seventy-nine percent of the marriages in the marriage-registration area for which type of ceremony was indicated were solemnized in religious ceremonies; 21 percent were solemnized in civil ceremonies. The percents of civil ceremonies for first-married brides and grooms (16 and 17, respectively) were less than half the percents for previously married brides (38) and grooms (36). There was wide variation among the States in the proportions of civil ceremonies for both first-married and previously married brides and grooms—for the first-married from 5 percent to 41 percent, for the previously married from 10 percent to 67 percent.

Because all States in the MRA (except Kentucky, where only the name of the person performing the ceremony is requested, and Ohio) request the title—Reverend, Rabbi, Judge, etc.—of the person solemnizing the marriage to be shown on the marriage certificate or record form, it is possible to determine whether the ceremony was civil or religious. In 1960, 57 percent of the sample records from Kentucky also showed the title of the officiant.

Whether the ceremony was civil or religious was not stated for an estimated 11 percent of the marriages in the MRA. Ohio's marriages accounted for almost 70 percent of these not stated data.

Data on marriage order and age at marriage of brides and grooms married in each type of ceremony are shown in tables 1-R and 1-S and 2-25 and 2-26 in Section 2. Statistics in relation to four categories of religious ceremonies with data from the six States which report the denomination of clergymen officiating at religious ceremonies are shown in table 2-27.

Among all brides and all grooms who remarried, the proportion of civil ceremonies was slightly more than twice as high as among brides and grooms at first marriage (table 1-R). Among first-married grooms, the proportion of civil marriages was higher for those married at ages 35 and older; among brides the data showed no marked trend as age increased. Among the brides who remarried, this proportion declined as age at marriage increased; but among grooms who remarried the proportion rose to a peak for the age group 35-44 years and then declined for ages after 44.

Among the States in the MRA, most of those that had relatively high proportions of civil ceremonies for first marriages also had high proportions for remarriages (table 1-S). States with relatively low proportions of civil ceremonies include California (especially for remarriages), Delaware, Hawaii, Maine, New York (only for first marriages), Oregon, Utah, Virginia (especially for remarriages), and Wisconsin. Those with high proportions include Alabama, Georgia, and New Hampshire and (especially for remarriages) Alaska, Montana, and Wyoming. Connecticut and Nebraska were exceptional in combining low proportions of civil ceremonies among first marriages with high proportion among remarriages.

The statistics on the distribution of religious ceremonies among the major religious groups—Protestant, Roman Catholic, and Jewish (table 2-27)—indicate relationships of these distributions to the marriage order of brides and grooms. The fourth category of religious ceremonies, other and not stated, includes in two States (California and Pennsylvania) substantial numbers of cases for which the denomination of the officiating clergyman was not reported. For those religious ceremonies reported as Protestant, Catholic, or Jewish, the percent of first-married brides married in Protestant ceremonies varied from 27.8 in Rhode Island to 94.0 in Virginia. These proportions are similar for first-married grooms. Proportions of first-married brides wedded in Catholic ceremonies varied from 5.7 in Virginia to 70.8 in Rhode Island, with

corresponding percents of grooms being similar. For first-married brides and grooms married in Jewish ceremonies, the proportions varied from none in South Dakota to almost 6.0 in Pennsylvania. For previously married brides and grooms, the percent having Protestant ceremonies varied from about 98 in Virginia to 43 for brides and 50 for grooms in Pennsylvania; percents having Catholic ceremonies varied from less than 2 in Virginia to 40 for brides and 31 for grooms in Pennsylvania. Except for Pennsylvania the proportions of remarried brides and grooms married in Jewish ceremonies did not exceed 2.2 percent; reports from Pennsylvania indicated the highest proportions married in Jewish ceremonies (17 for brides and 19 for grooms).

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Sampling Variability of the 1960 Marriage Statistics

The following statements are essential to understanding the limitations and uses of the small numbers in those tables in Sections 1 and 2 which are based on data from probability samples of marriage records. The headnote to each such table includes "Based on sample data."

For national, regional, and marriage-registration area statistics: Sampling errors are shown in tables 7-8, 7-9, and 7-11 in the Technical Appendix. In order to reflect more clearly general patterns of relationships and to retain the convenience of numbers which add to marginal totals, data tables contain some individual small numbers which convey very limited information because the sampling error is so large.

For registration State statistics: Sampling errors are shown in table 7-11. In order to reflect more clearly general patterns of relationships and to retain the convenience of numbers which add to marginal totals, data tables contain some individual small numbers which convey very limited information because the sampling error is so large. It is suggested that for any number less than those shown in the column "minimum useful statistic" the interpretation be simply "small" rather than any more precise value.

The rule for selection of these minimum useful statistics is based on an argument that for statistics as small as 1 percent of the total for a State a relative error of up to about 60 percent can be tolerated with 95 percent confidence. This is a "central tendency rule" and there will, of course, be some deviation from it. Further, the figure of 10 observations rather than, say, 12 is shown because of somewhat greater convenience in presenting and interpreting the minimum useful number.

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SECTION 3: DIVORCES—ANALYSIS AND SUMMARY

Alexander A. Broel-Plateris, Ph. D.

Highlights

Divorce and annulment statistics for 1960 are based on a nationwide sample of divorce transcripts, with estimates available for the United States, each region, the divorce-registration area (DRA), and each of the 18 divorce-registration States.

The number of divorce and annulment decrees granted in 1960 was 393,000, or 2.2 per 1,000 total population. This rate was the same as that for 1957 and 1959 and lower than that for any other year since 1941 except 1958. One married female out of every 109 was divorced in 1960. The divorce rate for the geographic regions varied considerably—0.9 for the Northeast, 2.1 for the North Central, 2.8 for the South, and 3.4 for the West.

Data for the divorce-registration area indicate that there is a relationship between the number of divorces and age of husband and wife at time of decree. The divorce rate per 1,000 married women was 8.7, but the rate where the wife was under age 20 was 27.7. Corresponding divorce rates for husbands were 8.8 per 1,000 married males and 24.5 per 1,000 males under 25 years of age.

The median duration of marriage at divorce was 7.2 years for the United States as a whole, but differences were marked among the four regions—the median was 9.0 years for the Northeast, 7.4 for the West, and 6.9 for the North Central and the South. The duration of marriage was slightly longer for cases in which the husband was the plaintiff than for those in which the wife was the plaintiff. Duration of marriage at time of decree is associated with the number of children reported and with the divorce laws of the individual States.

Children were reported in 56.7 percent of all divorce cases. This is a considerable increase from the 45.5 percent in 1953. In 23.0 percent of the divorce cases one child was reported, two children in 17.4 percent, three children in 9.7 percent, four children in 4.0 percent, and five children or more in 2.6 percent of the cases.

The estimated number of children involved in divorce cases was 463,000 for 1960 as compared with 330,000 children for 1953—an increase of 40 percent. This increase took place despite the comparative stability of the annual number of divorces granted.

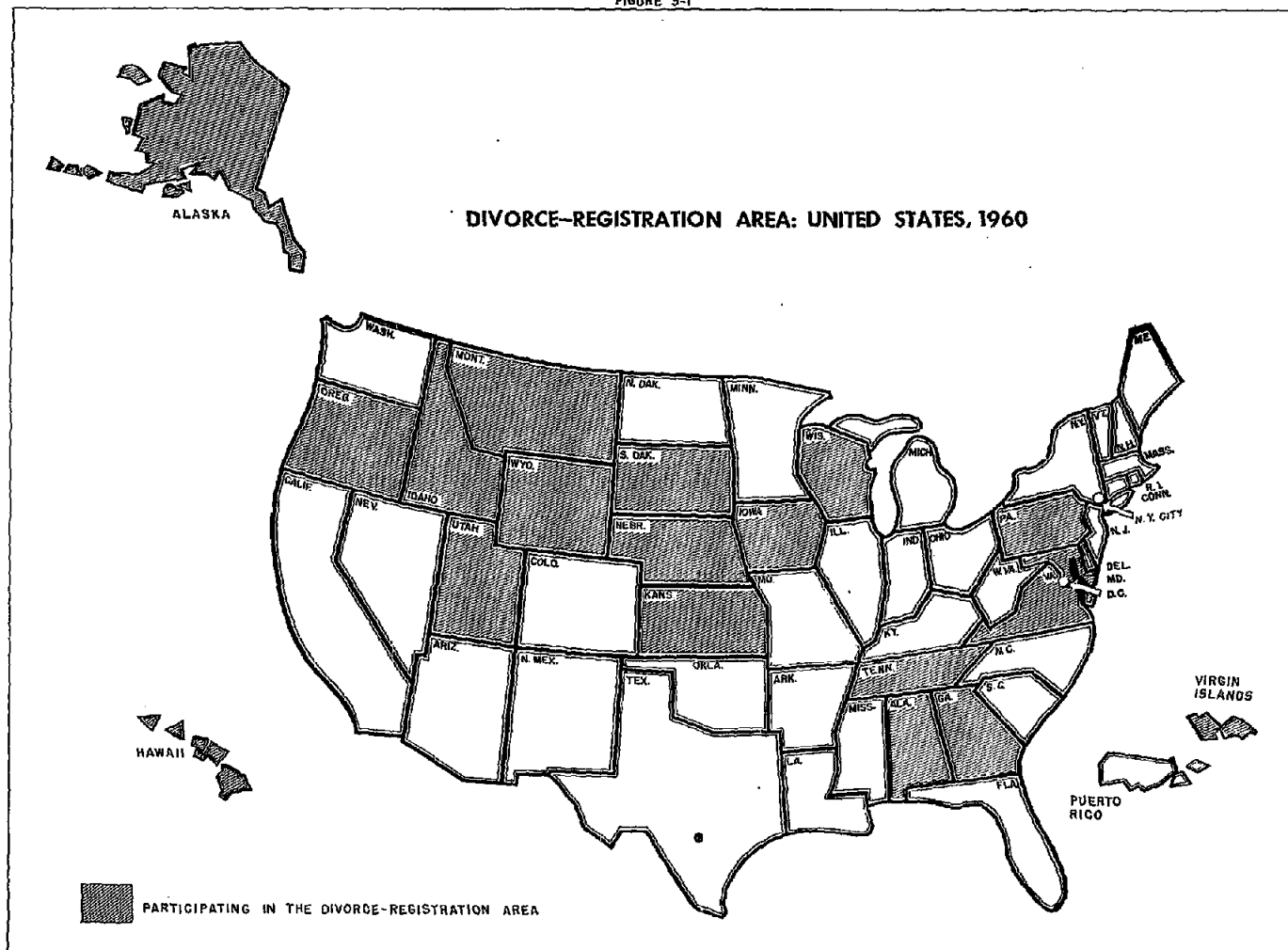
Sources of data

Divorce and annulment data for 1960 were obtained for the first time from a nationwide sample of transcripts received from the 18 States participating in the divorce-registration area—Alabama, Alaska, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Maryland, Montana, Nebraska, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Tennessee, Utah, Virginia, Wisconsin, and Wyoming—from 4 States and the District of Columbia not participating in the registration area, and from selected local areas in the remaining 28 States. The Virgin Islands are also included in the DRA, but data from this area are published in Section 6. The sample design made it possible to compute estimates for the United States, the four regions (Northeast, North Central, South, and West), the divorce-registration area, and each State included in the DRA (fig. 3-1). Information about personal characteristics of husband and wife, particularly age and the number of this marriage, was not stated on a large proportion of the sample transcripts. The reporting of the duration of marriage, number of children involved, and legal variables was much more complete. Detailed information on the sample design, sampling variability, and data completeness is given in the Technical Appendix (Section 7).

The sample made it possible to obtain selected data that were not available previously—age of husband and wife at marriage; residence of the defendant and of plaintiff; month of marriage; duration of marriage by number of children, by plaintiff, and by legal grounds; and color of husband by color of wife. The following statistical items are not being published due either to high sampling variability or to incompleteness of data: month of decree; cross-tabulations of age at time of decree with other variables; data on age by single years; data on the second, third, and fourth marriage of husband and of wife (these are collapsed into one category, "remarriage"); and detailed data on State where marriage was performed.

In addition to data based on sample transcripts, annual State and county totals were obtained in pretabulated form from State or local officials. These totals were used in consistency checks for estimates obtained from the samples. The type and completeness of State and county totals are discussed in the Technical Appendix.

The estimated total number of divorces and annulments granted in the United States during 1960 was 393,000, a decline of 0.5 percent from the previous year and an increase of 6.8 percent over the 1958 total and 3.1 percent over that for 1957. The crude divorce rate was 2.2 per 1,000 total population, the same as for 1959 and 1957 and slightly higher than the 1958 rate of 2.1. The divorce rate per 1,000 married females 15 years of age and older was 9.2 for 1960 as compared with 9.3 for 1959, 8.9 for 1958, and 9.2 for 1957 (table 3-A).

Since two persons are involved in each divorce case, 786,000 persons were divorced in 1960, or 4.4 per 1,000 total population, and one divorce or annulment decree was granted per 456 persons or per 109 married women.

Trend of the divorce rate

The present divorce trend differs considerably from that prevailing before the end of World War II. Prior to the all-time peak in 1946, the trend showed a general tendency to-

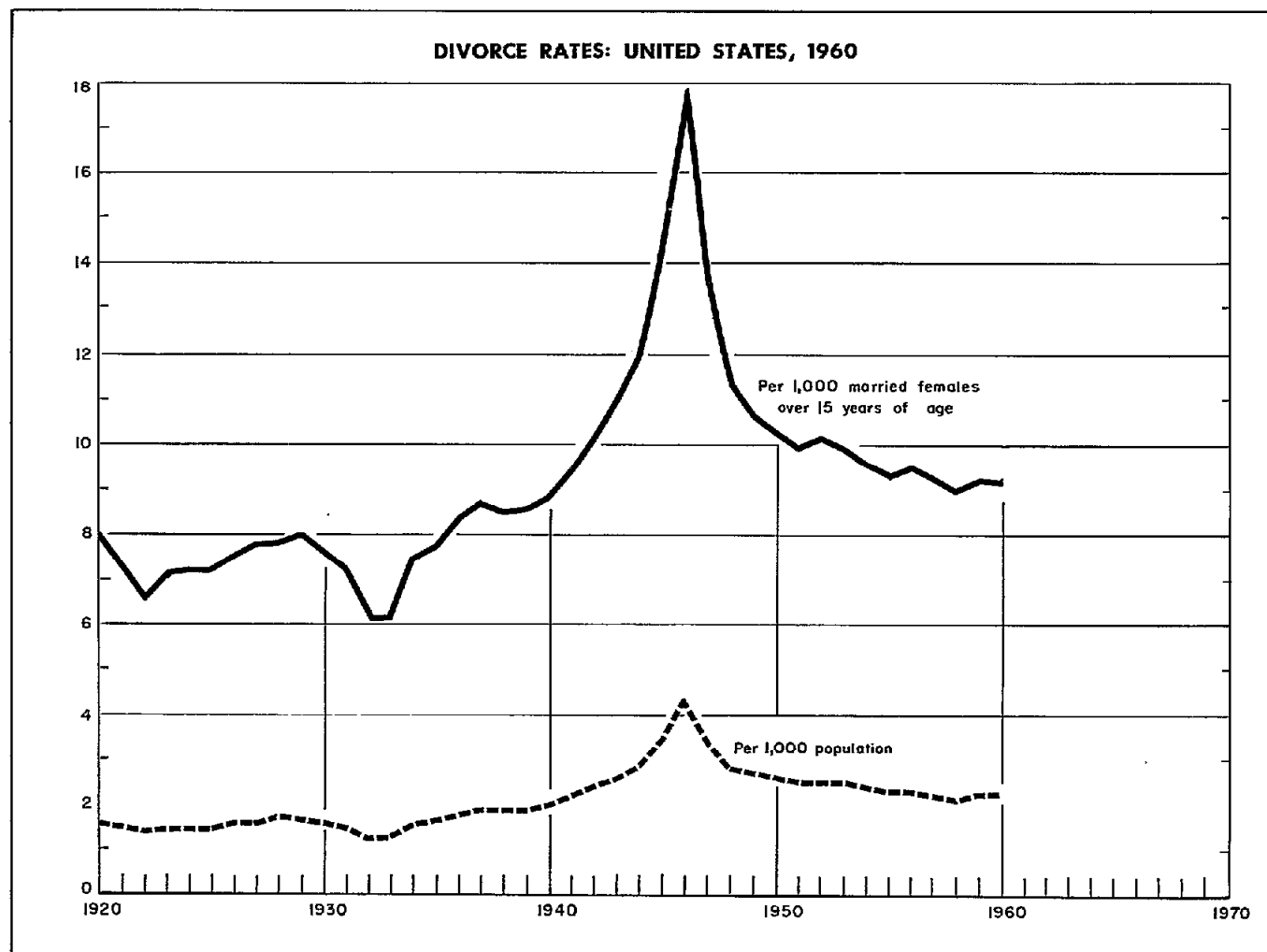
ward increase, which was accelerated by wars and reversed by economic depressions. After 1946, the rate declined and gradually leveled off at about 2.2 per 1,000 population. Hence, the popular belief in a continuing increase of the divorce rate does not describe the situation during the years following 1946.

Rates shown in table 3-A and figure 3-2 illustrate the situation prevailing during the past four decades. From the 1920 level of 1.6, the divorce rate declined to 1.4 per 1,000 population in 1922 and then rose to 1.7 for the years 1928 and 1929. During the depression years, however, the rate declined to 1.3 for 1932 and 1933 and thereafter increased to the level of 4.3 for 1946. Subsequently, the rate declined to 2.8 in 1948 and to 2.2 in 1957. Except for the rate of 2.1 per 1,000 population for 1958, the level of 2.2 continued through 1960.

Divorces by region and State

The divorce rates per 1,000 population varied widely among the regions—0.9 for the Northeast, 2.1 for the North Central, 2.8 for the South, and 3.4 for the West—with the

rate for the West being almost four times as high as that for the Northeast. These rates are affected by migration and age distribution of the population (table 3-B and fig. 3-3).

Annual totals of divorces and annulments for 1960 are available from all States and the District of Columbia even though some State figures are incomplete. The totals shown in table 3-B and in table 5-1 in Section 5 are based on complete counts of events reported from State and local offices, and for some States they may differ slightly from totals based on the sample shown in other tables.

Divorce rates computed for 47 States and the District of Columbia for 1960 were higher than those for 1959 in 14 areas, lower in 22, and the same in 10. In spite of the consistent decrease in the divorce rate for Nevada—from 36.6 per 1,000 population in 1956 to 29.6 in 1960—this State had the highest rate of any State for the 5-year period. For 1960 it was over 13 times as high as the national divorce rate. The second highest divorce rate of 5.3 was reported for Alabama. The lowest rates for 1960 (between 0.4 and 0.9 per 1,000 population) were reported for New York, New Jersey, North Dakota, and Wisconsin. In Illinois, Kansas, and Maine the divorce rate was the same as the national rate. Due to incomplete reports, no State rates were

computed for three States—Arkansas, Kentucky, and Louisiana.

The number of annulments granted in 1960 in 45 States and the District of Columbia was 11,181 (table 3-C). In the remaining five States (Arkansas, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Utah) annulment figures were included in the divorce and annulment totals but were not reported separately. The largest annulment figures were reported from two States—California, where 5,466 annulments were granted in 1960, and New York with 2,569 annulments. The 8,035 annulments granted by these two States constituted almost three-fourths of all reported annulments. The reported annulments constituted 3.4 percent of all divorces and annulments granted in the 45 reporting States and the District of Columbia. However, in California this percentage was 11.1, and the incomplete annulment figure from New York was 35.5 percent. The smallest percentages (less than 0.5 percent) were obtained from Georgia, Indiana, Mississippi, Nevada, Ohio, and Vermont; no annulments were granted in Rhode Island. These variations were due in part to the difference among the legal regulations in individual States.

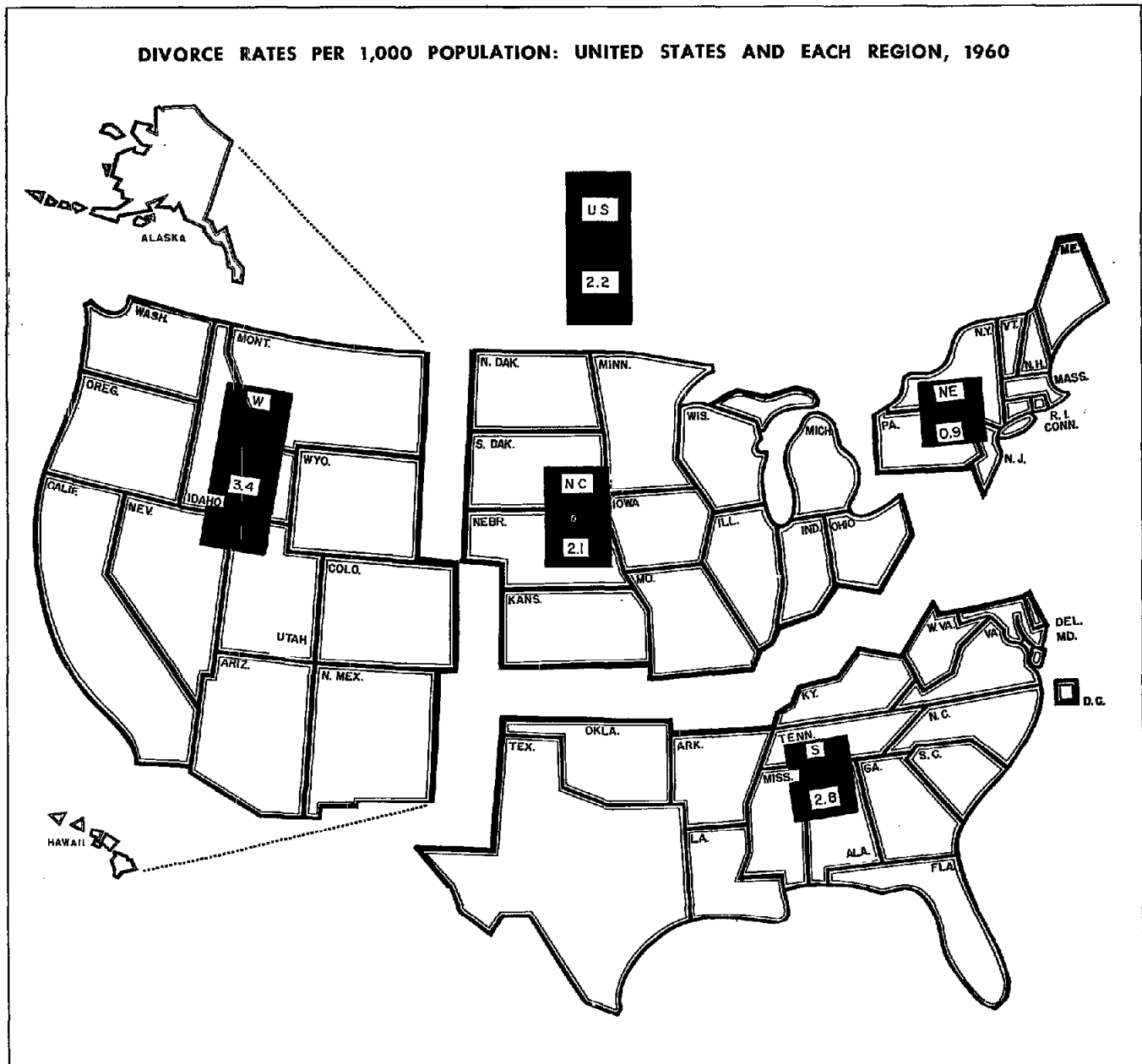


Table 5-1 in Section 5 shows the numbers of divorces and annulments by county and the completeness of reporting of divorces and annulments by county for each State, and table 6-2, Section 6, gives similar data for Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Age at divorce

For the divorce-registration area, there is a marked concentration of divorces in certain age groups. About one husband out of every five was in the age group 25-29 years, and about one wife out of every four was in the group 20-24.

The numbers declined consistently with each subsequent 5-year age group (table 4-3 in Section 4). Similar distributions by age have been observed for younger age groups.

When the age distribution of persons divorced in 1960 is compared with the distribution of the total married population in the registration States, it can be seen that the modal 5-year age groups for married men and women are older than the modal age at divorce.

In the 18 registration States combined, there were 1,037,289 married men in the age group 25-29, where the largest number of divorces occurred, 1,254,387 in the age group 30-34, and 1,345,349 in the group 35-39. For married

women the comparable figures were 979,275 in the group 20-24, 1,204,397 in the group 25-29, and 1,357,409 persons 30-34 years of age.¹ This indicates that the proportion of persons obtaining divorces is higher among married men under 30 years of age and among married women under 25 than among those of older ages. Age-specific divorce rates computed from 1950 census data also show a consistent decline with age.²

Further evidence of the higher incidence of divorces at the younger ages may be seen in the rates computed from the 1960 data. Divorce cases with age not stated (41 percent of the total figure for the DRA) were distributed proportionally among the age groups, and then divorce rates by age were computed. For the DRA the rates for the youngest age groups were markedly higher than those for the total married population—8.8 per 1,000 married men and 8.7 per 1,000 married women as compared with 24.5 for married men under age 25 and 27.7 for married women under age 20. The value of these rates depends on the accuracy of the assumption that the age distribution in the age not stated category is similar to the available age distribution. Rates were computed for States that had a satisfactory reporting of age at divorce. For Hawaii the rate was 9.4 per 1,000 married men and 9.8 per 1,000 married women, but for the two youngest age groups it was 16.9 for men and 15.8 for women; for Iowa, the rate was 6.8 for both married men and married women, but 20.8 and 27.2 for men and women in the two youngest groups; for Tennessee they were 10.8, 10.6, 35.3, and 40.5, and Wisconsin, 4.0, 4.0, 11.0, and 14.0, respectively. State rates are less reliable than rates for larger geographical areas, but for each State the younger age groups had higher rates.

In the 18 registration States combined, median age at divorce was 34.1 years for men and 30.9 years for women (table 3-D). Similar medians were obtained for smaller groups of States in earlier years—in 1959 with 12 States reporting, the medians were 34.2 and 30.9, and in 1958 with 8 States reporting, 33.7 and 30.4. For 1960 the highest median ages at divorce were found in Wisconsin (36.7 for husbands and 33.5 for wives), South Dakota (36.4 and 33.1), and Pennsylvania (36.2 and 32.9). The lowest median ages were 27.5 and 23.6 in Alabama and 31.8 and 28.2 in Utah.

Age at marriage

Information on age at marriage of husbands and wives who were divorced during 1960 is given in table 4-4 of Section 4. This information is shown for about 58 percent of the divorces in the DRA; it is also shown for each registration State. The modal age at marriage was 20-24 for divorced husbands and under age 20 for divorced wives. Forty percent of the divorces for which information about

age at marriage is available occurred to husbands who were married at ages from 20 through 24, and 45 percent occurred to wives married under the age of 20. The same modal age groups were found in all registration States, except for wives in Hawaii, where the largest number were married between 20 and 24 years of age. Fifty-six percent of the divorced husbands and 73 percent of the wives were married under age 25, and of those married under age 30 the percentages were 74 and 84, respectively.

Median ages at marriage for the DRA were 24.2 years for husbands and 20.9 years for wives (table 3-D); these ages were 10 years lower than the median ages at divorce (34.1 and 30.9, respectively). For individual registration States, the median age at marriage for husbands was lowest for Alabama (21.9) and Virginia and Tennessee (23.5) and highest for South Dakota (26.3) and Alaska (27.3). For divorced wives, the lowest median ages at marriage were 18.4 years for Alabama and 20.1 for Tennessee and Nebraska; the highest median ages were 22.0 for Wisconsin, 22.8 for Hawaii, and 23.3 for Alaska. Differences between the median age at marriage of divorced persons and median age at divorce were less than 6 years for both husbands and wives in Alabama and Alaska; they were over 11 years for husbands and wives in Pennsylvania and Wisconsin and for wives only in Maryland and South Dakota.

Some indication of the relationship between age at marriage and probability of divorce is obtained by comparing the percentages of divorced husbands and wives who married at a given age with the percentage of the same age among brides and grooms married in earlier years. This will indicate whether a given age at marriage is overrepresented or underrepresented among the divorced population. Thus, in a group of 15 registration States from which data are available, men under 20 years of age at marriage constituted 16.4 percent of husbands divorced in 1960, while men of this age represented 13.2 percent of grooms married in 1959, 12.9 percent of those married in 1958, and 12.0 percent of those married in 1957. For females, the group under age 20 at marriage represented 46.0 percent of wives divorced in 1960, 39.1 percent of brides married in 1959, 39.0 of those married in 1958, and 37.8 percent of those married in 1957. These data indicate that the very young marriages are somewhat overrepresented among the 1960 divorces.

Divorce rates by age at marriage were not computed for this report. Age at marriage refers not to the year when divorce was granted but to the year when the divorce couple was married. Persons who had the same age at marriage were married in various calendar years; the base populations for the computation of rates by age at marriage were not available.

Divorces by color of husband and of wife

In the divorce-registration area color was reported in almost 70 percent of all cases. About 89 percent of the divorced husbands and wives reporting color were white and 11 percent members of various nonwhite races (table 4-5 in Section 4). The color distribution of divorced persons in individual States depended in part on the distribution of the total population and on family life norms prevailing in various

groups. Very few divorces were granted to nonwhites in the reporting North Central and Mountain States; the smallest percentage (1.3) was in Idaho, where 1.5 percent of the total population was nonwhite. Hawaii had the highest percentage of nonwhite divorces—54 percent of divorced husbands and 59 percent of wives—while the total population of the State was 68 percent nonwhite. In the continental United States, the largest proportions of divorces granted to nonwhites were found in the reporting Southern States—Virginia had 22 percent of divorces granted to nonwhites and 21 percent of nonwhites in the population, Georgia 16 and 29 percent, and Tennessee 12 and 17 percent, respectively.

The relationship between color and divorce was not uniform in all States. For example, the divorce rate per 1,000 married males was higher for whites than for nonwhites in Hawaii (11.9 per 1,000 as compared with 8.1) and in Tennessee (10.6 per 1,000 as compared with 9.7), but this proportion was higher for nonwhites than for whites in Virginia (10.3 per 1,000 compared with 7.5) and in Wisconsin (16.5 compared with 3.7). Rates per 1,000 married females showed similar variation.

The information on the color of both husband and wife is available for 64,413 couples divorced in 1960, or for 68.5 percent of all divorces in the registration States. In 63,921 cases, or 99.2 percent, both husband and wife were of the same color—either both white or both nonwhite even though the nonwhite spouses may have belonged to different races. In 492 cases 1 spouse was white and the other nonwhite. Divorces of white husbands married to nonwhite wives were slightly more numerous than divorces of nonwhite husbands married to white wives (275 and 217 divorces).

The number of divorces and annulments for 1960 by color of husband and of wife for the divorce-registration area are given below:

More than one-half of all interracial divorces that occurred in DRA States were granted in Hawaii (270 decrees, or 55 percent), 41 such decrees were granted in Alaska (8 percent), 74 decrees in the 5 reporting continental Western States (15 percent) 67 in the 6 reporting Northeastern and North Central States (14 percent), and 40 in the reporting Southern States (8 percent). No interracial divorces were reported from Alabama or Tennessee.

Divorces by marriage order of husband and of wife

Information about the number of marriages of the divorced husbands and wives is available for 51 percent of husbands and wives who were divorced in the divorce-registration area. Two registration States (Nebraska and Virginia) did not report this information, and the reported data are incomplete for several other States. Hence, the detailed information about second, third, and higher order marriages was not tabulated, and the available statistics were consolidated into two categories—husbands and wives married once and those married more than once.

For the reporting States in the divorce-registration area there was marked variation among the States in the proportion of divorces that terminated a first marriage or a remarriage (table 4-6 in Section 4). In general, slightly less than three of four divorced husbands and wives had been married once, and about 27 percent of the husbands and 28 percent of the wives had been married more than once. There is a marked regional pattern in this regard with a smaller proportion of remarried persons divorced in States east of the Mississippi than west of it.

Beginning with data for the year 1958 there has been a slight decline in the proportion of reported divorces terminating a remarriage. In that year 31 percent of the divorcing husbands and 32 percent of the wives in six reporting States were terminating a remarriage. In 1959 these percents were 29 and 30, and the number of reporting States was 10; in 1960, as indicated, the percents were 27 for husbands and 28 for wives.

In 1960 24 percent of the grooms and 25 percent of the brides were remarrying after one or more previous marriages. Corresponding percentages for 1959 were 22 and 23, and for 1958 they were 21 and 22 percent. Thus divorces for the reporting States had a higher proportion following remarriage than was true of all marriages occurring in 1960 and the 2 immediately preceding years. However, the differences are too slight to be significant.

Residence of the defendant

To what extent does the defendant in a divorce action reside in the same State as the plaintiff? Some light is thrown on this question by the tabulation for 1960 of place of residence of defendants for the States of the divorce-registration area (table 4-2 in Section 4). Information about the residence of the defendant is available for 71.6 percent of the decrees granted in the registration States combined. The not stated category includes all decrees granted in Kansas, where the question on residence is not requested on the divorce record form. A divorce suit can be filed only in the State where the plaintiff has his legal residence, even though occasionally residence is established in a State with permissive laws for the purpose of obtaining a divorce. Hence, the State where the decree was granted is always the State of residence of the plaintiff.

A higher proportion of defendant husbands than of defendant wives resided in the same State as the plaintiff—

82.9 percent compared with 73.7 percent. The remaining defendants were approximately evenly divided between the two other categories—resident of other State in same region and not resident of any State in region—about 8 percent of defendant husbands and about 13 percent of defendant wives belonged to each of these two categories.

Differences between the States are marked. Defendant husbands residing in the same State as their wives ranged from 89 percent and over in Iowa, Montana, Nebraska, Wisconsin, and Wyoming to about 73 percent in Maryland and Virginia. Resident defendant wives ranged from 79.5 percent for Nebraska to 53.1 percent for Idaho.

The percentages of defendants residing in other States of the same region and of those residing outside of the region vary markedly between the individual registration States. In Idaho the former group was more than twice as large as the latter, 16.3 and 6.7 percent for husbands and 34.3 and 12.6 percent for wives. In Nebraska the situation was reversed, and residents of a different region were about three times as numerous as residents of other States of the North Central Region—6.8 and 2.6 percent for husbands and 16.0 and 4.6 percent for wives.

Duration of marriage

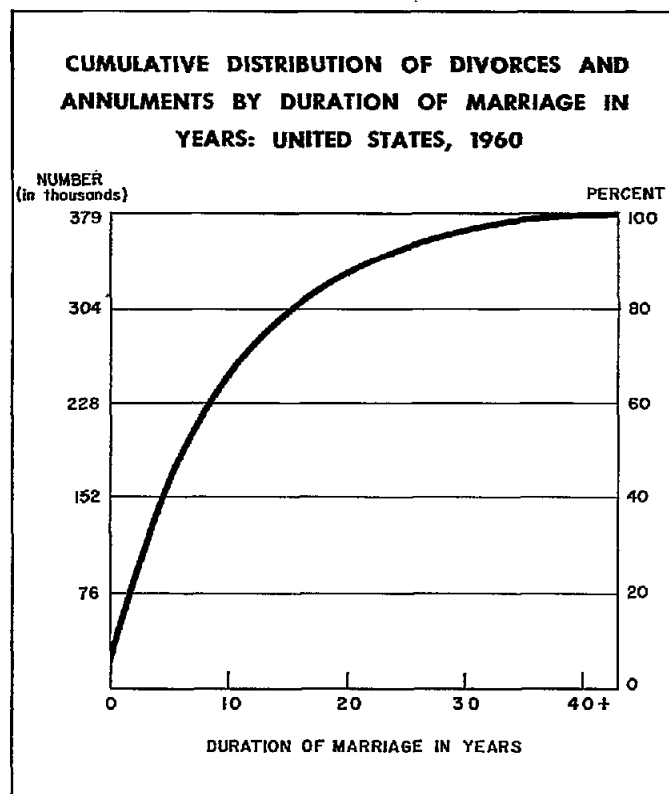
Data on duration of marriage to time of decree is available for 96.2 percent of all divorces granted in the United States. Cross-tabulations of divorces with other variables had the following levels of completeness—national data on duration by number of children reported were 92.3 percent complete; DRA data on duration by plaintiff were 94.5 percent complete.

National and regional statistics on duration of marriage at divorce for 1960 are given in table 4-7 in Section 4. Most marriages ending in divorce are of relatively short duration. Over one-third of all divorces were granted after a duration of less than 5 years and close to two-thirds after less than 10 years (table 3-E). On the other hand, some of these marriages had continued for many years. Nearly one-eighth had lasted for 20 years or longer (fig. 3-4). The highest percentage of divorces for any single year of duration was 8.1 for both 1 year and 2 years. Percentages declined with each additional year of duration, and divorces granted after 9 years of marriage comprised 3.9 percent of all decrees.

The percentage distribution of divorces by duration of marriage varied considerably between regions and registration States. The largest number of cases in any single year of duration was 3 years in the Northeast, 2 years in the North Central, 1 year in the South, and 4 years in the West (table 3-E). The modal duration was 1 year in nine States, 2 years in five States, and 3 years in four States. In the Northeast only 1.7 percent of the decrees were granted after less than 1 year of marriage, but in the South this percentage was over four times higher. In Idaho and Wyoming more than 10 percent of the divorces had a duration of less than 1 year, while in Pennsylvania this percentage was only 1.5. In the Northeast 14 percent of the marriages lasted 20 years or more, in the North Central and South about 12 percent, and

in the West less than 11 percent. In Maryland and Pennsylvania more than 15 percent of marriages lasted 20 years or longer, but in Alaska only 6.7 percent lasted that long.

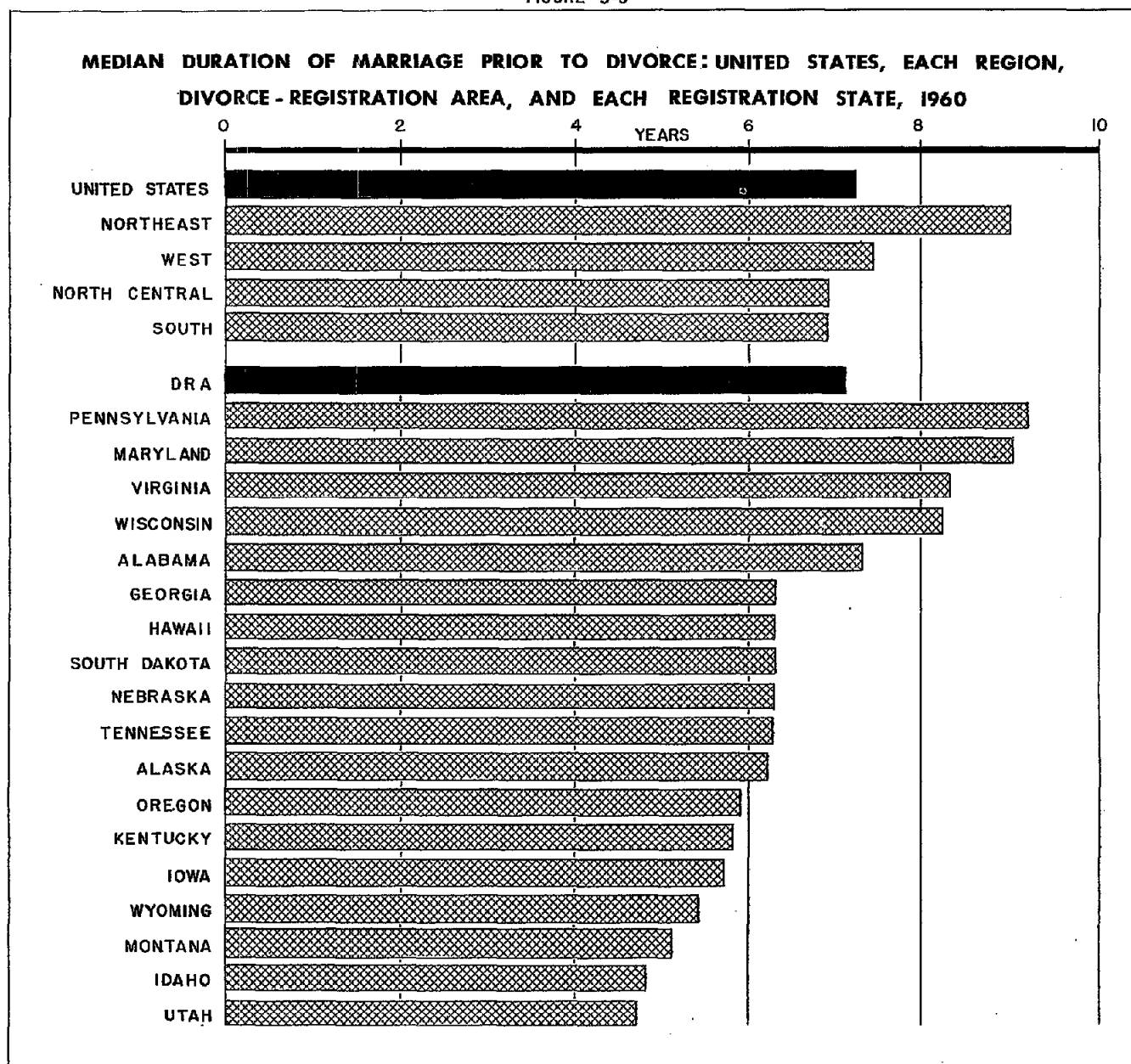

The median duration of marriage at divorce for the United States as a whole was 7.2 years, but differences were marked among the four regions (fig. 3-5). For the Northeast it was 9.0 years, for the West 7.4 years, and for both the North Central and the South 6.9 years (table 3-F). For individual registration States these medians range between 4.7 years (Utah) and 9.2 years (Pennsylvania). When the husband was the plaintiff, marriages lasted on the average slightly longer than in cases where the wife was the plaintiff (table 4-12 in Section 4); median durations for the two categories were 7.7 and 7.3 years, respectively. These medians are computed from grouped data and differ slightly from medians computed from single-year data.

As one would anticipate, median duration of marriage at divorce is associated with the number of children reported (table 3-F and table 4-9 in Section 4). In general, duration increased with the increasing number of children. For the United States, the median duration of marriages with no children under 18 years of age was 4.8 years, with one child 5.9 years, with two children 9.3 years, and with three children or more 12.7 years. A similar pattern may be observed in most reporting areas. However, in Maryland, Pennsylvania, and Virginia, the duration of childless marriages is equal to or longer than that of marriages with on-

or two children reported. This may be due to a high percentage of couples with children already over 18 years of age who are not reported on the divorce records.

Median duration of marriage at divorce also depends upon State divorce laws. Legal procedures determine in part the time between the date the petition is filed and the date the decree is granted. Such grounds as desertion and insanity become legal grounds for divorce after varying periods of time. In all reporting States, the median duration of marriage varies depending on the ground for which the decree was granted. Unpublished data indicate that for the DRA the longest duration of marriage is for decrees granted for desertion (9.1 years); this duration is 8.2 years when

the decree is granted for adultery, 6.7 years when it is granted for cruelty, 5.9 years for nonsupport, and 5.4 years for all other grounds combined. Medians for many individual reporting States differ considerably from these figures.

Month when marriage was performed

The month of marriage of divorced couples is of interest in view of the marked seasonal trend of marriages. A relatively large number of marriages occur in June and much smaller numbers in January, February, and March. When examined by the date of marriage of the divorcing couple, one may inquire whether the divorces

granted in 1960 show the familiar seasonal pattern of marriage or a different one. As may be expected, the month of marriage of divorcing couples is not inconsistent with the seasonal pattern of the month of marriage of the general population. However, there are many minor variations. The number of divorces and annulments for 1960 are shown below by month of marriage for the United States and each region.

The largest number of divorces in 1960 was granted to couples married in June. For the United States they represented 11.2 percent of all divorces as compared with 12.0 percent of marriages performed in June of the same year and for the reporting States with 12.9 percent of those performed in June 1959 and 12.9 of those performed in June 1958. The percentages of divorced couples married in January, February, March, April, and December were larger than the percentages of marriages performed during each of these months in 1960, 1959, and 1958; 38.8 percent of the divorced couples were married during these 5 months combined as compared with 34.5 percent of the couples married during these months in 1960, 34.0 percent in 1959, and 34.2 percent in 1958. The percentages were reversed for May, June, August, and October. Only 35.2 percent of the divorced couples were married during these 4 months combined, while the percentages of marriages performed were 39.0 in 1960, 40.5 in 1959, and 40.7 in 1958. For marriages performed in July, September, and November, the situation varied from year to year.

The peak month of marriage for divorced couples was June in three regions and eight States, September in the West Region, and December in three States—Alabama, Alaska, and Georgia. The peak was July in two States—Tennessee and Virginia—and May, August, and October in one State each—Kansas, Utah, and Idaho, respectively. Two States—Hawaii and Oregon—had no single peak month.

For the United States, in 3 regions (Northeast, North Central, and South) and in 12 registration States the number

of divorced couples married in January, February, or March was smaller than the number married during other months. In the West Region the lowest monthly figure was for marriages performed in April.

Place where marriage was performed

The place where the marriage was performed is of interest in the analysis of divorce statistics in that it reflects the extent of migration from one State to another between the two events. Citizens of the United States are highly migratory, especially young adults, and it is probable that most of the movement between States is the usual type connected with such factors as job opportunities. Some minor portion of the interstate migration is for the purpose of obtaining a divorce under State laws considered more favorable than those of the State of marriage. What percentage of the total migration this represents is unknown.

More than half (57.5 percent) of all divorces granted in the United States in 1960 occurred in the State where the couple was married (table 4-1 in Section 4). Because of sampling variability, however, data showing the detailed distribution of divorces by State where marriage was performed were not prepared for 1960. For 42.5 percent of the cases the two events took place in different States. The Northeast had the highest proportion of divorces granted in the State where the marriage was performed (67.6 percent), and the West had the lowest proportion (45.5 percent). For both the North Central and the South Regions this percentage was approximately 61.

For the divorce-registration area, 56.9 percent of the divorces were granted in the State where marriage took place (fig. 3-6). The 13 States reporting this information for 1959 and the 9 States reporting for 1958 had 54.8 and 53.9 percent, respectively.

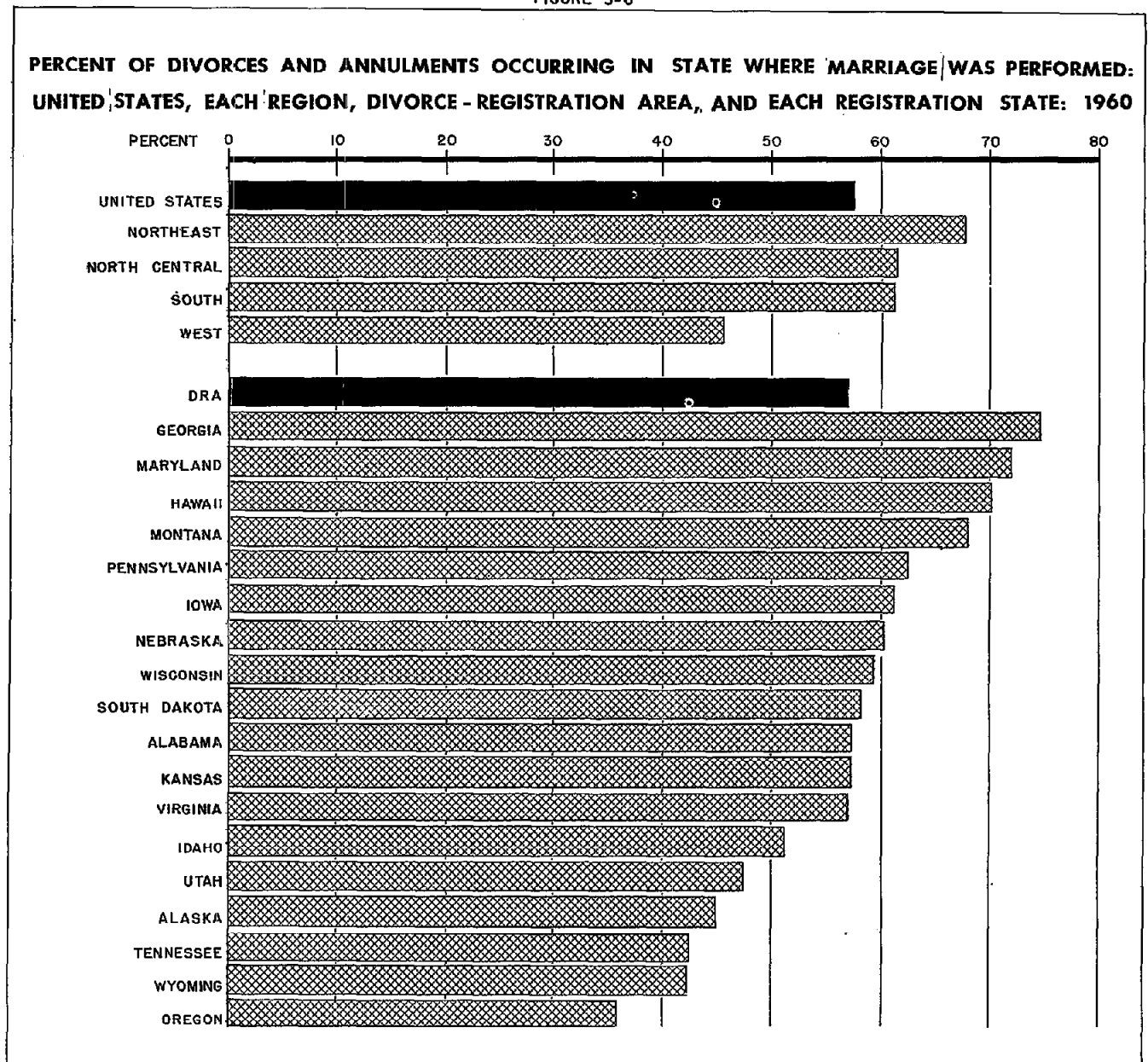
Georgia had the highest percentage of decrees granted to couples married in the State (74.6 percent). This proportion was only slightly lower in Maryland (72.0 percent) and Hawaii (70.1). On the other hand, five States had less than one-half of all divorces granted to couples married in the State—Oregon 35.8 percent, Tennessee 42.4, Wyoming 42.3, Alaska 44.7, and Utah 47.6.

Children of divorced couples

Information on the number of children reported is available for 93.4 percent of all divorces. Data from all areas except eight States in the DRA refer to children under 18 years of age; definitions of children reported from the eight States are shown in table 3-G. National data on the distribution of divorces by number of children reported (table 3-G and tables 4-8 and 4-9 in Section 4) indicate that 56.7 percent of the divorced couples reported children and 43.3 reported no children; the latter percentage includes both the childless couples and those that had children over the age of 18 who were not reported on divorce records. Two out of three divorced couples reported either one child or no children. In the remaining cases, two children or more

were reported. Families with five children or more represented 2.6 percent of all divorces (fig. 3-7).

The percentages of couples reporting no children were approximately equal in the North Central, South, and West Regions (43.3, 45.6, and 44.2 percent, respectively), but this percentage was considerably lower in the Northeast (31.2). Divorces of couples with five children or more occurred most frequently in the Northeast (3.3 percent) and least frequently in the West (2.1).

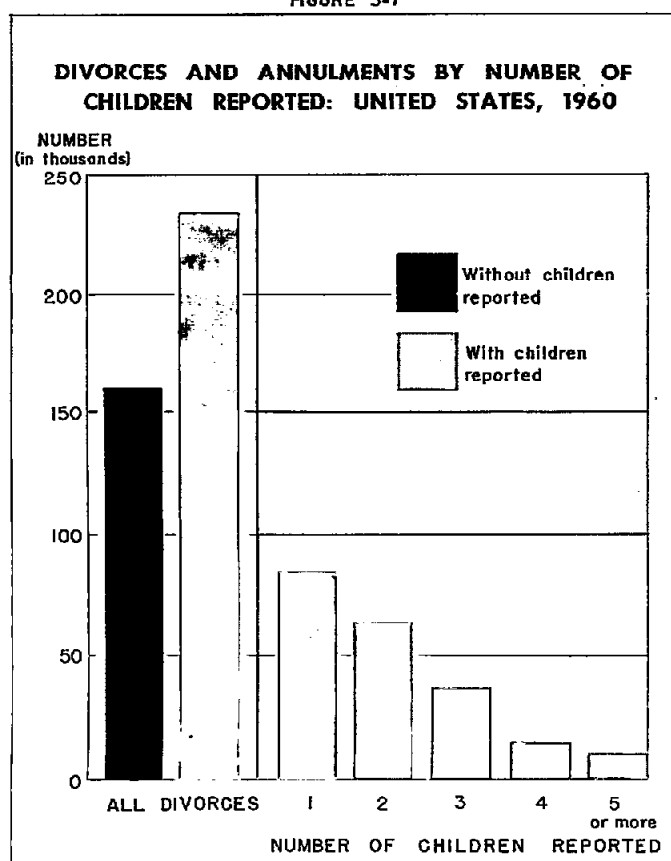
In 2 registration States (Pennsylvania and Hawaii) children were reported in more than 70 percent of all divorce cases; in 6 States between 60 and 70 percent of divorced couples reported children, and in the remaining 10 States less than 60 percent. The lowest percentage was found in

Tennessee (51.0). Couples with many children were most numerous among those divorced in Hawaii (7.3 percent of couples reported five children or more) and in South Dakota (4.9 percent); this percentage was lowest in Oregon (1.7) and Maryland (1.8).

The distribution of couples divorced in 1960 by the number of children under 18 years of age reported may be compared with a similar distribution of all families with married heads enumerated in the 1960 census.³ This comparison

(44.2 and 40.9 percent) but strongly underrepresented in the Northeast (31.2 and 45.0 percent). This percentage was the same for both groups in the North Central Region (43.3 percent). In the four regions, a higher proportion of couples divorced in 1960 than of all families had one child. For couples with two children or more, the reverse was true in all regions except the Northeast. In this region couples reporting two and three children were overrepresented among those divorced, while couples with four children or more included the same percentage of both populations.

The definitions given by the U.S. Bureau of the Census for "family" and "children" are as follows: "A family consists of two or more persons in the same household who are related to each other by blood, marriage, or adoption; all persons living together in one household who are related to each other are regarded as one family." "'Own' children in a household, family, or subfamily comprise the head's sons and daughters, including stepchildren and adopted children, living in the home. The count of own children under 18 years old is limited to single (never married) children...." Thus the Census tabulation of own children of married family heads excludes families with a widowed, divorced, or single head who was not subject to the probability of divorce and parent-child groups living in the same household with other relatives, where the head is a person other than the parent of the child.

An estimated 463,000 children were involved in divorce cases in 1960, 1.18 children per decree. Of the 64,202,010 children under 18 years of age enumerated in the United States during 1960⁵, 7.2 per 1,000 were involved in divorce cases. This rate was 7.5 in 1959, 6.5 in 1958, 6.4 in 1957, 6.3 in 1956, 6.3 in 1955, 6.4 in 1954, and 6.4 in 1953. (Population bases for these rates are the estimates of the number of children under 18 years of age prepared by the U.S. Bureau of the Census and published in *Current Population Reports*, Series P-25, No. 265.) A more accurate measure, however, is the rate per 1,000 children under 18 years of age of married persons, which was 7.8 for 1960.⁶

For the 1960 data year, the numbers of children involved were estimated for the first time for each region and registration State (table 3-H). The largest number of children (170,000, or 37 percent of the total) was reported from the South Region, 28 percent from the North Central, 23 percent from the West, and 12 percent from the Northeast. The average number of children per divorce was highest in the Northeast (1.40), followed by the North Central (1.22) and the West (1.14). It was lowest in the South with an average of 1.11 children per divorce.

The total number of children varied widely among individual reporting States. The largest numbers of children were estimated for Alabama (21,300) and Pennsylvania

indicates that families with no children and those with one child are slightly overrepresented in divorce cases. The percentage of childless couples was 43.3 among divorced couples and 40.7 among all families; it should be noted, however, that childless married couples living in separate households are not counted as a family in the census, but if such couples divorce, they will be included among those with no children reported. Hence the slightly lower percentage of childless couples among the enumerated families does not necessarily indicate that the proportion is higher among those who divorce than among the total married population. One child was reported by 23.0 percent of the divorced couples and 18.6 of all families with married heads. Couples with two children or more were underrepresented among the population that divorced in 1960; two children were reported by 17.4 percent of the divorced couples and by 19.0 percent of all families; three children by 9.7 and 11.5 percent, and four children or more by 6.6 and 10.2 percent, respectively.

The percentage distributions for the four regions refer to all families irrespective of the marital status of the head.⁴ In comparison with all families reporting no children, the childless divorced couples were overrepresented in the South (45.6 as compared with 42.5 percent) and in the West

(18,900); the smallest numbers were reported by Alaska (900) and South Dakota (1,200). The highest ratios of children per divorce were found in Hawaii (1.89) and South Dakota (1.51) and the lowest ratios in Georgia (1.02), Virginia (1.03), and Tennessee (1.04).

As shown in table 3-J, the estimated national total of children involved in divorce cases increased by 40 percent between 1953 (330,000 children reported) and 1960 (463,000). This increase occurred despite the relative stability of divorce totals in recent years because there was a decline in the proportion of divorces with no children reported and an increase in the average number of children per divorce. The ratio of children per divorce increased from 0.85 for 1953 to 1.18 for 1959 and 1960, and the proportion of divorce and annulment decrees with children involved increased during these years from 45.5 in 1953 to 56.7 in 1960.

The percent of divorces and annulments with children involved by reporting States for 1953-60 are as follows:

The proportion of divorces with five children or more reported also increased, from 1.8 for 1956 to 2.6 percent for 1960.

Legal grounds for decree

A distinction must be made between legal grounds for a decree and the underlying causes of the divorce or annulment. In some cases decrees are obtained on the ground that is least unpleasant to claim and easiest to establish in legal proceedings. Legal grounds for divorce and annulment are specified in the statutes of each State, and there are marked differences in the grounds available and in the definitions of individual grounds (table 4-10 in Section 4).

Almost two out of three divorces granted in the registration States were granted on the ground of cruelty, including indignities and mental suffering. This ground was alleged in the majority of divorces granted in 14 of the registration States, excluding Alaska, Kansas, Maryland, and Virginia. In the 14 States where it was the principal ground, the percentage of decrees granted for cruelty and related grounds ranged from 51.5 in Alabama to 93.8 in Iowa.

Desertion—including abandonment, absence, and combinations of desertion with other grounds—was alleged in

about one out of four cases in the registration States and represented the majority of decrees granted in two States, Maryland (65.6 percent) and Virginia (92.8 percent), and more than 20 percent of decrees granted in three States, Alabama (44.2 percent), Tennessee (23.5 percent), and Georgia (20.9 percent).

Only about 6 percent of all decrees were granted for nonsupport or nonsupport combined with cruelty, but divorces granted on this ground represented almost 80 percent of those that occurred in Kansas.

Less than 2 percent of all divorces were granted for adultery, including infidelity and adultery combined with other grounds, and in only one State (Maryland) did these divorces represent more than 10 percent of the State total.

All the remaining legal grounds are listed in the tables under "other grounds" and were alleged in only 4 percent of the cases. The situation was unusual in Alaska, where incompatibility was given as the ground in more than 90 percent of the divorces.

In a few cases, differences may be observed in the distribution of legal grounds between the 1960 data and corresponding figures for earlier years. In general, these differences are due to coding procedures. Divorce data for 1959 and earlier years were coded in the reporting States, and each State office used its own coding rules. Beginning with the 1960 data, uniform coding rules were applied to all divorce transcripts, and some shifts in the statistics were unavoidable. This was especially true for decrees granted on multiple legal grounds and those granted on grounds that are in force in only a small number of States. The following general principles were used in setting up the coding rules: (a) if the ground of adultery was given in combination with other grounds, the decree was coded to adultery; (b) if desertion was given in combination with other grounds except adultery, the decree was coded to desertion; (c) if nonsupport was given in combination with cruelty, the decree was coded to nonsupport; (d) the grounds of indignities, inhuman treatment, intolerable severities, and grievous mental sufferings were coded to cruelty; (e) the ground of abandonment was coded to desertion. In cases of multiple legal grounds, a more specific and more structured ground is coded in preference to one that is more general and more subject to varying interpretations; legal grounds in force in only one State or in a small number of States are coded, whenever possible, to a similar legal ground available in a large number of States.

Plaintiff and the party to whom decree was granted

Divorce data for 1960 include information about plaintiffs in suits of divorce or annulment. In the divorce-registration area, the plaintiff was the wife in more than two out of three divorces, in almost one third of the cases the husband, and in only six cases was it another person, including parent or guardian (table 4-11 in Section 4). The 1960 percentage distribution of divorces and annulments by

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plaintiff and by party to whom granted for the registration area are shown below.

A comparatively small percentage of decrees was granted by the court to someone other than the plaintiff. The decree was granted to the wife in about 6 percent of the divorces where the husband was plaintiff, and in about 1 percent of cases where the plaintiff was the wife the decree was granted to the husband. Moreover, more than 4,300 decrees, or 4.9 percent of the total, were granted to a person other than husband or wife, or to husband and wife jointly; all except 18 such decrees were granted in two States, Alabama and Georgia.

There is some variation among States in the proportion of decrees where the wife is plaintiff; the highest proportion of plaintiff wives (80 percent) was in Utah, and the lowest (63 percent) occurred in Alaska.

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NOTES

Reporting areas

Marriage data are shown for both Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Divorce data are shown for the Virgin Islands only.

Geographic classification

Data are shown by place of occurrence. Totals are shown for the local areas St. Croix Island and St. John and St. Thomas Islands (the latter two combined) in the Virgin Islands and for the primary geographic subdivisions, "municipios," in Puerto Rico.

Race and color

For 1960, brides and grooms are not shown by color for either Puerto Rico or the Virgin Islands. Husbands and wives divorced in 1960 are classified as white or nonwhite for the Virgin Islands.

Sample data

Since the sampling rate for the Virgin Islands for both marriage and divorce records was 100 percent, there is no sampling error in the statistics for this area. The marriage estimates for Puerto Rico are based on a 5-percent sample; sampling errors for estimated frequencies which are specified percents of the total marriages are as follows:

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SECTION 7. TECHNICAL APPENDIX

INTRODUCTION

Improvements in marriage and divorce statistics

In 1960 new programs for collecting marriage and divorce statistics were initiated. Instead of compiling the data from predesigned tables submitted by the States, data were processed from nationwide probability samples of marriage records and divorce records submitted by State and local registration officials. Four principal improvements have resulted from this major change in data collection procedures.

1. Probability samples of the records facilitate making statistical estimates for the United States and each of the four geographic regions (Northeast, North Central, South, and West) in addition to statistics for the marriage- and divorce-registration areas and States in these areas.
2. Progress has been made toward greater uniformity in definitions of concepts and in coding procedures because the data from the sample records were processed in one operation at the National Vital Statistics Division (NVSD).
3. Improvements resulted from several checks on the consistency of data, on whether or not the events recorded on the records occurred in the data year, and on completeness of reporting for each variable coded from the records. In particular, detailed comparisons were made of annual marriage and divorce totals as reported by the States and counties cooperating in the sample and as estimated from the samples sent in. When these totals differed, intensive followup querying procedures were carried out to determine the correct total.
4. In preparing for and securing the samples, NVSD has gained much additional information about registration procedures, about adapting sampling instructions to State and local variations in the filing of records, and about time and costs involved in securing samples of records.

Sources of data and kinds available

Historical data.—The first Federal report on marriages and divorces in the United States covered the years 1867-86 and was devoted primarily to detailed divorce statistics.¹ The introduction states "while this report is practically complete as regards divorces, it is thoroughly incomplete and unsatisfactory so far as marriages are

concerned." This was indeed the case, for the only information shown about marriages was the number performed in about two-thirds of the counties in the United States, and no national statistics or estimates were available. Divorces, on the other hand, were shown for the United States, all States, and all counties. In addition, detailed statistics showing the legal grounds for divorce, the party to whom the decree was granted, and the duration of marriage were presented by State and year.

The next Federal report dealt primarily with the 20-year period 1887-1906 and also summarized the earlier report.² It contained data on the number of marriages for more than 90 percent of the counties in the United States but no figures of national scope. In 1946 national marriage totals for the years 1867-1906 were estimated from these incomplete collections.³ The divorce data were more varied and complete, including not only the number of decrees for almost all counties but also detailed statistics on legal grounds, libellant, time from marriage to separation, place of marriage, and whether children were affected by the decree.

Plans for compiling statistics and publishing a report to cover the 10-year period 1907-16 were curtailed by the Nation's entry into World War I. The resulting report⁴ contained a statement of the number of marriages performed during the single year 1916 for almost all counties in the United States. The collection of divorce statistics was likewise very nearly complete. Unlike the earlier collections made by agents working directly with county officials and court clerks, the 1916 data were secured entirely by mail from State and local files.

The program was resumed with a report for 1922, and for 11 years collections were made and reports published annually.⁵ Statistics shown in these reports were chiefly continuations of the series published for earlier periods. Increasing reliance was placed on collecting information by mail. In the 1926 annual report estimates of national totals and rates per 1,000 population were published for the years 1907-15 and 1917-21 to partly close the gaps in the series.

The annual reports ended in 1933, and no national statistics were collected again until 1940, when a new program of marriage and divorce statistics was initiated. Data continued to be available, however, from those States in which central files of the records had been established. On the basis of figures collected from these States and the District of Columbia, estimates of the number of marriages and of divorces for the United States and rates for the years 1933-37 were prepared by Stouffer and Spencer.⁶ Their report contains a discussion of the possible sources and magnitude of errors in the estimates.

The program initiated in 1940 was based on establishing a marriage and a divorce collection area comprised of those States maintaining central files of records from which detailed data could be obtained. The project was discontinued during World War II, but figures collected for the 1937-40 period led to estimates of State and national totals and corresponding rates. In addition, detailed marriage statistics were published for the collection area for 1939 and 1940 and detailed divorce statistics for 1939.⁷ This was the first attempt to present detailed data about marriages—the 1940 statistics covering up to 28 reporting States. Detailed divorce data were obtained for 1939 from up to 12 States.

In 1944 a limited program of marriage and divorce statistics was resumed and some figures for the years 1941-43 were estimated by making use of State, Census, and Federal Home Loan Bank Board data. Reports were published in three series: monthly marriage license figures for major city areas;⁸ monthly marriage or marriage license figures for States and for the Nation;⁹ annual totals of marriages (substituting marriage licenses for some States) and of divorces for as many States as possible and an estimated national divorce total.¹⁰ Estimates of the national number of marriages for the period 1867-1946 and the rates were published in an annual report for 1946.¹¹

In 1948 a cooperative Federal-State program to provide some detailed statistics was begun. The vital statistics officials of several States furnished detailed tables which were consolidated and published. Tabulations for varying numbers of reporting States on marriage included those by month, by age of bride and groom, by first marriage and remarriage, by age and race, and by residence status of bride and groom.¹² Divorce data were shown for reporting States by month, State and county, legal grounds, party to whom granted, and duration of marriage.¹³

Until 1960 detailed marriage and divorce statistics continued to be collected by means of pretabulated reports from, on the whole, an increasing number of States. Data collection procedures used during the previous years are summarized in table 7-1. In tables 7-2 and 7-3 the overall growth, albeit irregular, in the number of States for which key items of data are published is shown. These statistics have appeared in the annual volumes titled *Vital Statistics of the United States* or in the series *Vital Statistics—Special Reports*. County totals of marriages or of licenses issued have been secured for counties in 90 percent or more of the States for the years shown in table 7-2. Among the other items, only month of marriage has been consistently available from more than half the States. Reporting of age at marriage has been more complete than other personal characteristics of brides and grooms. The trend in reporting all these variables, including race or color, has been toward greater completeness. This is most marked in 1960 with the centralized tabulating of these data from the records.

For divorces, data on month and county of occurrence have been most completely reported (table 7-3). Other items reported with considerable completeness are legal items usually obtained as part of the official transcripts—date and place of the marriage, children of the couple, legal grounds for the decree, and the identity of the person granted the decree. Personal characteristics of husbands and wives, even when requested on the statistical record form, are very often missing on records in most States.

In order to promote regular, timely, and complete reporting, marriage- and divorce-registration areas comparable to those developed for the collection of natality and mortality statistics were established in 1957 and 1958, respectively. The areas are made up of those States which meet the following criteria:

1. To have established central files of marriage or of divorce records
2. To have adopted a statistical report form which includes required items of information that appear on the Standard Record of Marriage (fig. 1) or the Standard Record of Divorce or Annulment (fig. 2)
3. To maintain regular (and timely) reporting by all local areas
4. To carry out, in cooperation with NVSD, tests of marriage or divorce registration completeness and accuracy

The marriage-registration area (MRA) began to function in January 1957 with 29 States and 5 other reporting areas participating. By 1960 Alaska and Hawaii had become States, and Kentucky and Nebraska had joined the MRA, bringing the total to 33 States and 3 independent areas (Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and New Orleans, Louisiana). In addition, 8 States and the District of Columbia outside the MRA had central files of marriage records. The comparable divorce-registration area (DRA) was begun in 1958 with 14 States, Alaska, Hawaii, and the Virgin Islands participating. By 1960 this total had risen to 18 States including Alaska and Hawaii. Three other States and the District of Columbia maintained central files complete enough for selecting probability samples in 1960. Statistics about the growth of both the MRA and the DRA are shown in table 7-4. The following list shows the States and independent areas which were participating by 1960 and the areas not participating.

of records, special surveys were conducted. This was done by State officials in Arizona, Illinois, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, and Washington; county officials reported totals on a monthly basis from Colorado and North Carolina; the city clerk provided the figures for the five boroughs in New York City.

The number of marriages performed was reported for 45 States. The number of marriage licenses issued was reported for the District of Columbia and for five States—Colorado, Kentucky, Nevada, North Carolina, and Washington. The number of marriage licenses issued is usually larger by 1 or 2 percent than the number of marriages performed (based on findings for 1959 from 10 States reporting both totals, as shown on page 2-1, Section 2, Volume I of *Vital Statistics of the United States, 1959*). County totals of marriages performed were estimated for Kentucky by reducing each reported total of marriage licenses by 1 percent.

In 43 of the 45 States reporting marriages performed, a vital records or statistics agency in the State health department collected and reported the county totals. In Massachusetts, this agency is in the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth. County totals for Utah were tabulated in the National Vital Statistics Division from marriage records which were submitted by the Bureau of Vital Statistics, State Department of Health.

In five States county totals of marriage licenses were reported. The State registrar in the department of health made special collections of county totals in Nevada and Washington; these totals were reported in Kentucky by the department of revenue and in Colorado and North Carolina by county officials who reported directly to the National Vital Statistics Division. Reports for the District of Columbia were received from the U.S. district court.

Data on divorces and annulments are presented for 50 States and the District of Columbia. Statistics were received from State officials of 48 States—from the health departments of 46 States, the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and the Administrative Office of the Courts in New Jersey. In 14 States (Arizona, California, Illinois, Indiana, Minnesota, Nevada, New Mexico, New York, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Texas, Washington, and West Virginia) where central files of divorce records were not required by law, the State registrars of vital statistics conducted special surveys to obtain statistics. One State, Utah, submitted only the annual State total and transcripts of about two-thirds of all divorce and annulment decrees. The county totals obtained from the transcripts were adjusted to conform to more complete information received from Utah subsequently. Data for two States (Colorado and Kentucky), as well as data for some counties of Missouri and New Mexico and for some parishes of Louisiana, were obtained from a survey of local officials conducted by the National Vital Statistics Division. Divorce records are administered and reported by the District of Columbia municipal court.

Tables 7-5 and 7-6 present information about the items on the marriage and the divorce record forms of each State sampled from central files. All the forms had space for data on the month of marriage or divorce

and all but one on the place. However, only 30 of the marriage forms specified the county in which the marriage occurred while 37 specified the city or town. Minnesota and Missouri had neither of these items on their forms, but Missouri provided space for reporting place of marriage. Items to be coded for divorces were found on State record forms with only a few exceptions—Kansas secured no data on residence of husband and wife; Nebraska and Virginia, no data on number of times parties to the divorce had been married; and Ohio, none on race or color. For marriages, estimates of civil and religious ceremonies were made chiefly by distinguishing between officiants who were clergymen and those who were civil officials. These data were not requested on the forms of

Ohio and Kentucky (though often available from Kentucky since the name of the person performing the ceremony was given). This variable was not tabulated for areas outside the MRA. Among items of data about the bride and groom, age at marriage or date of birth and State of residence were available from the record forms of all States with central files. Some data about the marital history of the bride and groom were available from all MRA States. However, the record forms of Ohio and Michigan included only information about number of previous marriages of each person and not about marital status before marriage. On the other hand, the number of this marriage did not appear on the forms of four MRA States (Idaho, Kansas, Maryland, and Oregon). Despite these

variations in the records, marriage order (first marriage or remarriage) could be determined for all MRA States. Among central file States, no items related to marital history were found in the record forms of Arkansas, Minnesota, South Carolina, and West Virginia.

Several additional items of information are found on the marriage and the divorce forms of a number of States. These include birthplace, occupation, residential address, and last grade of school completed. A few marriage forms include one or two items of demographic information about the parents of the bride and the groom. Several divorce reporting forms include added data about such legal matters as the contesting of the initial action, custody of children, and arrangements for financial support.

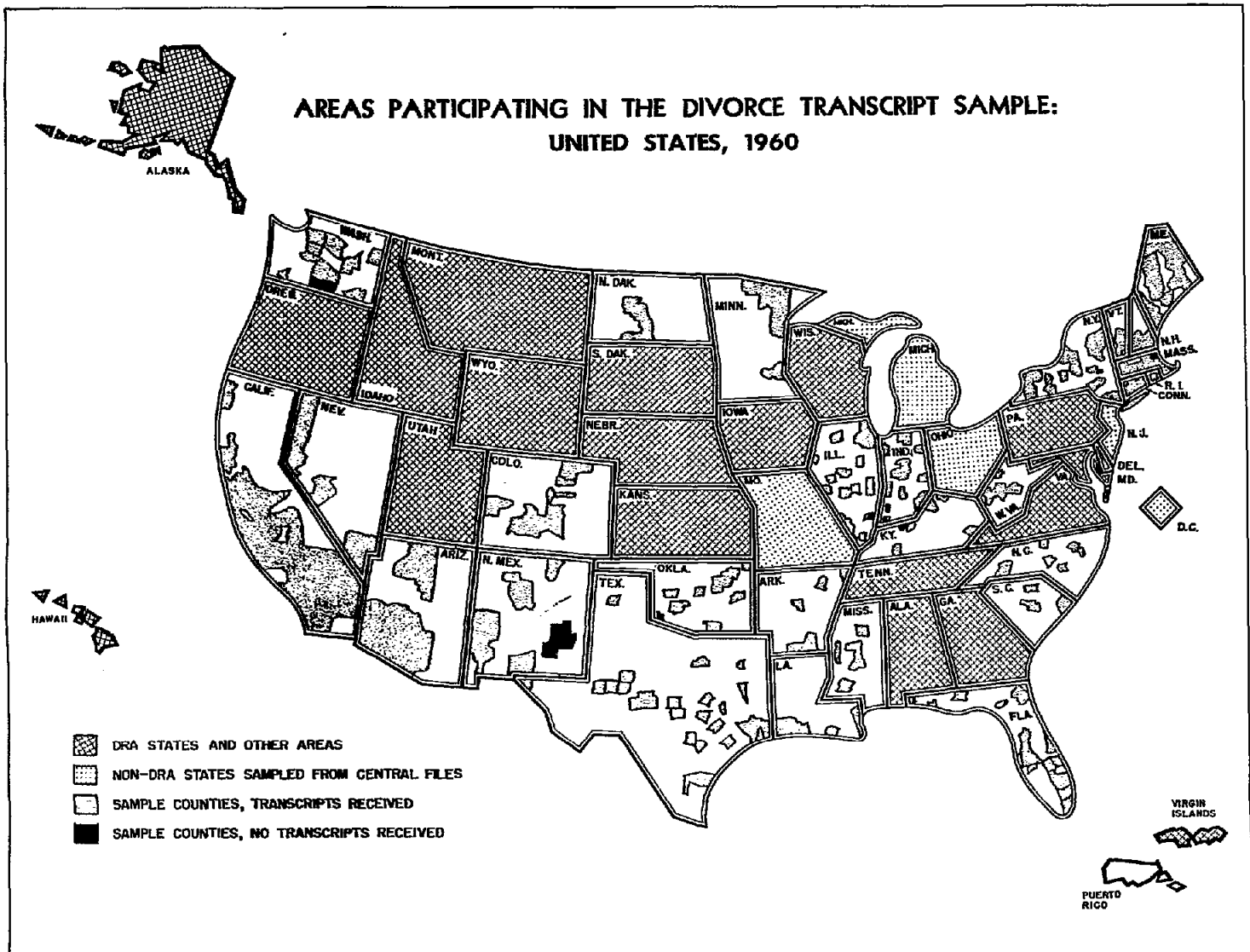
DESIGN OF THE SAMPLES

Information about the structure of the samples is shown in table 7-7 and maps of the reporting areas in each of the two samples in figures 7-3 and 7-4.

The marriage sample was designed to yield estimates of area totals as well as frequency distributions and estimates of their parameters. These estimates were to be made for the United States, for each of the four regions, for the marriage-registration area, and for each State in the registration area.

The sampling rate selected for each State was such that the resulting sample would be at least 400 records, the number required to secure estimates having less than

ability (sampling rate) with which the county was selected and the probability with which records were selected from the county's files. The sampling rates are over twice as large in Stratum 6 as the rates in Stratum 5 to offset the added sampling error arising because the small counties in Stratum 6 were not selected with certainty. The District of Columbia marriage records office voluntarily contributed records at the same sampling rate as that in effect in MRA States with approximately equal annual totals even though it did not participate in the MRA. All areas outside the MRA except the District of Columbia were sampled at rates too low for individual State estimates. In addition the methods used in selecting the counties do not insure that they will be representative of their States. The returns were used only to supplement the larger returns from MRA States in order to make regional and nationwide estimates.

Sampling procedures in the divorce sample paralleled those for the marriage sample except that the sampling rates in each stratum were much larger than corresponding rates in the marriage sample. A minimum of 400 sample records was secured from each State in the DRA. Sampling intervals (reciprocals of rates) for first-stage sampling of reporting areas outside the DRA were 200 in the North-

east Region, 400 in the North Central and West, and 800 in the South. The entire divorce sample was selected from 18 States in the DRA, 3 States and the District of Columbia sampled from central files and 97 counties selected with certainty (Stratum 5), and 189 other counties (Stratum 6).

COLLECTING AND PROCESSING THE SAMPLE DATA

Agreements specifying procedures for selecting sample records and payments to be made by NVSD were arranged for each reporting area. Materials sent to States included manuals describing the importance of the special 1960 samples and defining the items of information needed along with instruction sheets describing methods of sample selection. The Public Health Service regional representatives and many State registrars explained the programs and secured the cooperation of most of the local county and court officials in charge of the records. Complex problems arose in assembling the records which were to be sampled. In the case of marriages the population consisted of all marriages which had been performed during 1960, but several of the files were arranged by date of issue or

date of filing of the license; consequently licenses issued for marriages solemnized more recently than 1960 and some licenses of marriages solemnized in 1959 rather than 1960 were sampled. For divorces the population to be sampled consisted of all annulments and absolute decrees of divorce which became final during 1960. However, court files usually include many actions in addition to divorces, and if the divorce cases are filed by date of petition, they may be found scattered throughout several years' cases. A number of sociologists and other persons familiar with local files of records cooperated in securing the samples of marriage and divorce records in a number of counties.¹⁴

Early in the sequence of procedures, table plans were drawn up prescribing the detailed tabulations to be prepared. After these tabulations were completed and reviewed, however, the final tables shown in Section 2 were prepared in much less detail in order to reduce the number of published frequencies with large sampling errors. Since these data are estimates based on samples which were small, especially from non-MRA and non-DRA States, several of the tabulations are less detailed than those prepared from pretabulated reports from the States in 1959 and preceding years. Because of high proportions of missing responses for the personal items on divorce records, it is impossible to publish the divorce statistics in Section 4 in as great detail as those in Section 2 for marriages. In both sections the statistical coverage extends to the regions and the Nation, but noticeable sacrifices of detail were made in these estimates.

In the analytical text and tables for marriages (Sections 1 and 2) a major emphasis is that of comparing age at marriage variations for the marriage-registration area and the United States, as well as for regions and individual States. Age at marriage distributions are presented for such subpopulations as whites and nonwhites and single, widowed, and divorced brides and grooms. These comparisons are made in terms of specific rates, based on populations of those areas which reported the necessary data, and in terms of percents based only on data reported. Frequencies with which data were not stated are shown in tables 7-13 and 7-14.

The analytical tables for divorces feature relatively complete analyses of variations in durations of the marriages dissolved and in numbers of children involved. These are critical variables—the first as an index of marital and family stability, the second as part of an estimate of the number of persons affected by the dissolutions of these marriages.

ESTIMATING PROCEDURES

Area totals

Before data were tabulated and statistics estimated, adjustments were made in order to reconcile totals estimated from samples received with pretabulated counts for each reporting area. A description of the compilation of totals tabulated in counties and States along with adjustment of these totals and those estimated from samples of records follows.

Marriages.—The total of marriages for the United States is based on reported data on marriages or marriage licenses as tabulated in counties and States and includes estimates for missing counties in two States (Colorado and North Carolina) and incomplete data from three States (Arkansas, Missouri, and Texas). The totals for Colorado and North Carolina, for which the county figures are based on monthly reports of marriage licenses from local clerks, include estimates for areas for which reports had not been received for 1 or 2 months. These estimates are made each month by assigning to each area for which a report is lacking the same proportion of the month's total as the area represented in the preceding 11-month period.

No adjustments were made of totals estimated from samples and pretabulated totals for those reporting areas in which this pair of totals differed by one sampling interval or less.

Arbitrary adjustments were made of each pair of totals differing by more than one but not more than two sampling intervals. In each of these cases, the weighted sample total was adjusted to within one sampling interval of the pretabulated total by selecting one sample record at random to be tabulated twice if the total estimated from the sample was the lesser of the two totals or by selecting one sample record at random and excluding it from the tabulations if the total estimated from the sample was the greater of the two. Among the MRA States single records were selected and excluded for two and selected and duplicated for three. Only one exception occurred—in one State two records were selected and duplicated at random, since two unused licenses discovered at a later date were excluded and could not be replaced from the State files. For the MRA, the weighted total of records excluded is 30; of records added by duplication it is 170. The net addition to the weighted total for the MRA is 140.

Outside the MRA single sample records were selected at random and excluded from samples in each of 11 counties; single records were selected and duplicated in each of 3 central file States and 26 counties. For the States outside the MRA the weighted total of records excluded is 4,136; the corresponding total of records thus duplicated is 10,857. The net addition to the weighted total for the non-MRA States is 6,721. Net increases in total marriages for the United States and each region are as follows:

Punchcards with all items coded as "not stated" except State and year of marriage were prepared for a small number of sample records not received. The weighted totals of such marriages are 3,480 in the entire MRA, none in the Northeast or the West Region, 1,105 in the North Central, 7,594 in the South, and 8,699 in the entire United States.

Divorces.—The total number of divorces and annulments granted in the United States based on county and State tabulations is estimated on the basis of the assumption that in each State where estimates were made for non-reporting counties (Arkansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, and New Mexico) the divorce rate for the nonreporting areas was identical with that for the reporting areas of the same State. The totals for eight counties in Indiana and two counties in Washington are noted as estimates. These estimates were made in the State offices.

Adjustments were made if the pretabulated count for a reporting State or county differed from the estimated total based on the sample by more than one sample interval used for the selection of the sample in a given area. When it was known that the pretabulated rather than the sample total was correct, the sample was adjusted; in case of doubt, the

estimate based on the sample size was used in preference to the pretabulated figure. Totals based on sample estimates were used in lieu of pretabulated totals for 12 DRA States, 2 States reporting from central files, and 99 local areas. Punchcards with all items except area and year coded as "not stated" were added to the sample in all cases when the sample was short. A total of 304 cards representing 696 events were added to the sample of 2 DRA States where, as a matter of policy, incomplete divorce records were not filed by the State vital statistics offices; a total of 124 blank cards were added to the samples received from 24 local areas. Twenty-eight transcripts selected at random were deleted from the samples of 14 local areas.

Frequencies

Estimating procedures of frequencies were essentially similar for both samples. Frequency distributions were estimated first and from these percents, rates, and means or medians were computed. Frequencies were estimated in two steps:

1. Each sample case, and all items tabulated for that case, was assigned a weight which was the reciprocal of the probability with which the case was selected. Thus, if a marriage record was selected from a county with a probability of 1/500, each item on that record carried a weight of 500, whereas if 100 percent of the records were processed from an MRA State, each item on each such record carried a weight of 1.
2. Frequencies were estimated by summing the weights instead of tabulating the number of sample cases. Thus, each frequency distribution, such as age at marriage of first-married brides, is a sum of the weights of the sample cases included.

It should be noted that, within each registration-area State, the weights of all sample records are identical. However, as shown in table 7-7, the records in a distribution of all MRA States vary in weights from 1 to 100 and of the United States from 1 to 800. Divorce sample records for the DRA vary from 1 to 20 and for the United States from 1 to 160. Variation between two or more equal sub-totals in the relative proportions of cases with various weights results in each such subtotal's having its distinctive sampling error.

Percents and rates

Percents in the analytical tables were computed using data which excluded estimated numbers of not stated cases.

All rates appearing in the analytical tables were based on populations from the U.S. Bureau of the Census. These are populations present in the area on April 1, 1960, including Armed Forces stationed in the area but excluding Armed Forces abroad. In the computation of marriage rates specific for color, marriage order, and previous marital status for the MRA, Ohio and Michigan were excluded from both the estimates of marriages and the base populations because Ohio did not supply information for rates for white and nonwhite persons or rates for single, widowed, and divorced persons and Michigan for the latter rates.

Since age-at-marriage data were available from all reporting areas in the sample, none are excluded from the age-specific rates for all brides and all grooms. It should also be noted that all data used in the rates were completely reportable for the Northeast Region and that data on color were completely reportable for the South and data on marriage order for the MRA.

The base populations used in computing the marriage and divorce rates in the analytical tables are shown in tables 7-16, 7-17, and 7-18 and tables in Section 5 of Volume I.

Children involved in divorces

The total number of children involved in divorces of their parents was estimated from national, regional, and State data on divorces and annulments classified by number of children reported. The following steps were used for each area (United States, each region, divorce-registration area, and each registration State):

1. The decrees with children not stated were distributed proportionally to those decrees for which number of children was reported.
2. For each group of divorces having an equal number of children affected by each divorce, the number of such children was multiplied by the number of such decrees (i.e., the number of decrees reporting one child was multiplied by one; the number reporting two children by two, and so on, ending with those reporting five children). A corresponding estimate was made for decrees for which six or more children were reported. In this category the factor 6.7, an estimate of the average number of children per decree, was multiplied by the number of such decrees. This factor was computed from comparable data for earlier years, when figures were available for numbers of children higher than six.
3. The six products obtained in step two were summed to secure the estimate of number of children affected by divorces for each area.

SAMPLING ERRORS OF THE ESTIMATES

Each estimate computed from the samples has a variability termed its sampling error, since it is not based on a complete count of marriages or of divorces occurring in 1960. Since all cases in these samples were selected with known probabilities, this sampling error can be computed for each estimate. Each sampling error shown in tables 7-8 through 7-12 is the amount which, when added to and subtracted from the estimated frequency or percent, gives the interval within which the actual quantity being estimated lies in approximately two out of three similar samples. For example, the sample estimate of the number of wives under 20 years of age at the time of the divorce in 1960 is 100,000, which has a sampling error of 2,700, the chance is 2/3 that the result of a complete count of wives under 20 years at divorce in 1960 will lie between 97,300 and 102,700. If one lengthens the interval to two sampling errors above and below the estimate (in this example, 94,600 to 105,400) the chance of including the actual quantity becomes 95/100.

The sampling errors (one σ) for a range of percents are shown in table 7-8 for the United States and each region. As is true generally for estimates of percents, the ratio of the sampling error to its estimate (relative sampling error) declines as the percents estimated increase.

Tables 7-9 through 7-12 present the sampling errors for arrays of frequencies for the United States and each region and for the registration areas and participating States.

It will be observed that marriage frequencies of 1,000 for the United States have relative sampling errors of 45 percent and frequencies of 5,000 have relative sampling errors of about 20 percent. Since these sampling errors are high—much higher than frequencies of the same magnitude for the MRA—it is well to note that figures of 4,000 or less may be viewed as part of a larger distribution, as, for example, age at marriage for widowed females, but their value as individual frequencies is doubtful. Their chief use in this regard is in indicating that the frequency being estimated is likely to be less than some specified relatively small figure. For example, the chances are only 2.5/100.0 or less that an estimated 1,000 marriages in the United States of brides aged under 15 years could be 1,900 or more. (Estimate of 1,000 plus 2 sampling errors, or 900, equals 1,900.)

In general the sampling errors for frequencies of equal magnitudes are relatively smaller for the divorce than for the marriage sample, particularly for the regional estimates. Among the regions, estimated figures of 4,000 or less are most precise for the South. Figures of 5,000 to 6,000 are equally precise for the South and the West. Figures of 7,000 or more are most precise for the West. For divorces, estimates for the Northeast have markedly greater precision than those of equal magnitude for any other region.

In order to facilitate comparisons of sampling errors among registration States with widely varying totals of marriages or divorces, the sampling errors for the registration areas and participating States are shown for frequencies expressed as percents of State or registration area totals. The sampling error for the estimated percent corresponding to each frequency can be estimated by dividing the sampling error shown for the frequency by the total number of 1960 events reported for the area. As an example of the procedures described above for the States and registration areas, suppose the number of nonwhite marriages in California to be 10,500, approximately 10 percent of the total for the State. The error shown in table 7-11 for this frequency is 969. By adding and subtracting 969 from 10,500, one secures the interval 9,531 to 11,469; the chances are about 68 out of 100 that the actual number of nonwhite marriages is in this interval. In order to obtain the sampling error for 10 percent itself, divide 969 by the State total, 105,352, with a resulting sampling error of 0.9 percent. Thus, the chances are about 68 out of 100 that the actual percent of nonwhite marriages in California falls between 9.1 and 10.9.

Estimation of the standard error of a proportion in a subgroup of a subtotal—say, the proportion of nonwhite marriages in the age group 20-24 years—is accomplished

by the use of the formula

$$S_p = \sqrt{P_y^2 S_{x'}^2 - P_x^2 S_{y'}^2} / P_y^2 N.$$

P_y is the proportion that the denominator is of the total marriages of the State. P_x is the proportion the numerator is of the State total. $S_{y'}$ is the standard error of the denominator, and $S_{x'}$ is the standard error of the numerator. N is the total number of marriages for the State. Use of this equation can be best illustrated by an example. Suppose for the State of Alabama that 45 percent of the marriages of nonwhite brides from the sample fell into the age group 15-19 years and we want to approximate the standard error of this proportion. Suppose also that the estimated number of nonwhite marriages for the entire State was 8,000 and the number falling into the 15-19 years age group was 3,600. Eight thousand marriages is close to 25 percent (P_y), and 3,600 is close to 10 percent (P_x) of the 31,910 (N) marriages in Alabama during 1960. From table 7-11 we find for Alabama the standard error ($S_{y'}$) of the 8,000 to be 336 and ($S_{x'}$) of the 3,600 to be 234. Substituting the preceding values into the formula we obtain

$$S_p = \frac{\sqrt{(.25)^2 (234)^2 - (.10)^2 (336)^2}}{(.25)^2 (31,910)} = .024.$$

Therefore, the chances are about 68 out of 100 that the true proportion would be between .426 and .474.

To determine if two proportions are significantly different, divide the difference by the square root of the sum of the squares of their standard errors. If the quotient of this division is greater than 2, then the probability that the difference is due to chance is less than 1 in 20.¹⁵ (The figure 2 is the value (rounded) of "Student's" t , at the 5 percent level of significance, for the hypothesis that the difference between the two estimates is zero, when samples are large, 60 or more.) To illustrate, suppose we wish to compare the proportion of nonwhite marriages in the 15-19 age group for the two States, Alabama and Louisiana. Assume that the proportions were 45 percent with standard error .024 for Alabama and 49 percent with standard error .027 for Louisiana. Division of the difference by the square root of the sum of the squares of the standard errors gives us

$$\frac{(.49 - .45)}{\sqrt{(.024)^2 + (.027)^2}} = 1.1.$$

This value is less than 2; therefore the difference between the two proportions may well have been due to chance.

COMPLETENESS OF THE DATA

Marriage totals tabulated in counties and States were reported to be incomplete for two counties in Arkansas. No figures were received from one county in Missouri, from five in North Carolina, and from two in Texas. Special surveys of counties which delayed in reporting were conducted by the National Vital Statistics Division, with the permission of State officials, in Arkansas, Missouri, and New Mexico.

Similarly, totals of divorces and annulments were reported for all counties except 18 in Arkansas, 21 in Kentucky, 12 parishes in Louisiana, 1 county in Missouri, 3 in New Mexico, and 2 in Texas.

Among the various factors in 1960 data from marriage and divorce records which produce nonsampling errors, incompleteness of reporting is one of the most important. It is the one factor for which detailed and complete estimates are available. Tables 7-13 and 7-14 for marriages and 7-15 for divorces and annulments summarize the incompleteness of returns of sample records, of items appearing on State record forms, and of data not reported on individual sample records.

An important quality check was introduced to improve accuracy of record count. Estimates of the number of records which constituted complete reporting were developed for comparing, for each State and county reporting area in each sample, the total number of 1960 marriages or divorces as estimated from sample records received with the annual total as reported for the areas at the end of the year. Whenever these two totals differed by more than one sample interval (reciprocal of the sampling rate), investigation to reconcile this difference was undertaken. In most instances this involved querying county or State officials, but in several cases it was found that some records such as unused marriage licenses, duplicates, divorce decrees which were not final, and marriages or divorces which did not occur during the data year had been included in the samples or in the reported totals. This querying was a marked aid in improving the accuracy of the pre-tabulated totals and in varying sampling procedures to fit variations in local policies, especially in local filing practices. An intensive effort was also made to secure samples of records from those counties which delayed reporting, as well as from counties in a few States which delayed sending records to the offices of the State registrars. The services of 32 social scientists and 13 other persons familiar with local registration practices were secured to arrange for the sampling or to sample the files of records according to NVSD specifications. In most instances these persons also secured or checked annual totals of the records being sampled.

The final outcome was totals of marriages and divorces more thoroughly checked than those used when only pre-tabulated data were secured. In terms of these totals it is estimated that marriage records were not received for 0.6 percent of all marriages for the Nation, 0.4 percent for the MRA, 0.3 percent for the North Central Region, 1.4 percent for the South, and only trivial amounts for the other two regions (table 7-13). Among the States in the sample, the largest proportion of records not secured was in Kentucky,

where an estimated 13 percent of all records were not received. No records were secured from 1 of the 94 counties in the marriage sample. Corresponding percents of area totals for divorces are 1.9 for the United States, 0.7 for the DRA, and 3.6, 0.7, 2.1, and 2.5 for the Northeast, North Central, South, and West Regions, respectively. No records were secured from 7 of the 289 counties in the divorce sample.

Principal sources of incompleteness differed for the two samples. For marriages, the lack of an item on the record forms of a few reporting areas was the chief source of incompleteness. Thus, for the United States, the fact that the item color of bride and groom was not on the record forms of States and counties accounted for an estimated 200,806 marriages with color not stated, 13 percent of the national total, whereas the noncompletion of this item on forms on which race or color was included accounted for only about one-fourth as many not stated responses. For the MRA, the lack of this item in Ohio with 68,000 marriages with color not stated accounted for almost 8 percent of the MRA marriage total, whereas incompleteness of this item on records of all 32 other registration States accounted for less than one-fifth as many not stated responses. Analysis of the data on items not stated shows parallel situations for the reporting of marriage order, previous marital status, and type of ceremony. The not stated cases are concentrated in particular regions—in the case of color in the North Central, where 35 percent of the regional total is found in areas not reporting color on any of their records; in the case of marriage order and previous marital status in the South, where 17 percent of the regional total is found in areas not reporting these items.

Responses to most of these items are relatively complete in areas where they are requested on the marriage record forms, and the items to be requested on the record forms of each reporting area should be standardized.

The principal source of incompleteness in the 1960 divorce statistics arises from failure to secure key items of personal and demographic data in several States even in cases where these items appear on the record forms. The proportion of records not stating age at decree varies among the 18 DRA States from less than 1 to 97 percent; for race or color the corresponding range is from 0 to 77 percent; for marriage order the analogous range among DRA States having this item is from less than 1 to 97 percent; for duration of marriage the range, aside from records not received for Maryland and Utah, is 0 to 17 percent; and for number of children the range, excluding States with many records outstanding, is from less than 1 to 28 percent.

For the United States, an estimated 7,630 divorce and annulment records (of a total of 393,000) were not received in the National Vital Statistics Division. By region, 1,417 of these were in the Northeast, 700 in the North Central, 3,152 in the South, and 2,361 in the West. For the divorce-registration area, collections of sample transcripts were incomplete in two States. Samples were not received for 110 divorce records in Maryland and 586 in Utah; hence, the total of such divorces for the DRA was only 696 of the 94,074 divorces granted in 1960.

IMPROVEMENTS IN REGISTRATION AND STATISTICAL PROCEDURES

The tests of completeness applied to the data were much more detailed and exacting than any ever applied, so far as is known, to marriage and divorce statistics in the past. Over the approximately 5-year course of planning these sampling procedures and collecting and processing these data, many improvements have occurred in registration and statistical procedures. These improvements have been formulated and carried out in all of the various groups involved—judges, attorneys, and court clerks concerned with accurate data about divorce; county clerks and other local registrars many of whom gathered "extra" data for the marriage records sample; State registrars and their staffs whose concern that all records be collected resulted in an unusually complete picture of the incompleteness of reporting of the statistical items; and Federal specialists in vital statistics who sharpened and clarified concepts and collecting and processing procedures as well as inspecting the data in minute detail for inconsistencies, ambiguities, and errors. Specific gains are as follows:

1. Statistical estimates

Marriage statistics for the United States and the four regions have not been published previously except for the monthly and annual totals. These new statistics include month of marriage and age at marriage and, with less completeness, as previously noted, marriage order, previous marital status, and color. Similar gains were achieved for divorce statistics, except that these gains were chiefly confined to items on which information is usually secured during legal proceedings—duration of marriage, number of children affected by divorce, and date and place of the marriage ending in divorce.

2. Uniformity in definitions of concepts and in coding procedures

Several specific advances were made in both marriage and divorce statistics. For example: date of birth was used to compute age for all areas reporting this date; designations of race or color groups were uniform; ambiguities in coding counties of residence were noted and subsequently evaluated, particularly for States reporting only city or town and not county; when coding of occupations of grooms by Bureau of the Census procedures indicated that substantial proportions of the

responses were incomplete, the coding was stopped. In addition, awareness of needs for more careful studies of comparability in the items on divorce records "number of children" and "grounds for decree" increased.

3. Checks on consistency of totals and on completeness of item reporting

A major shortage was found in the number of marriage records submitted to one State office by a number of local offices; the extent to which duplicate marriage records were being received in another State office was more exactly estimated when checking consistency of totals; minor discrepancies were found in totals for more than a third of the reporting areas in the marriage sample.

Major shortages in reporting of divorce records by local officials were found in two States; several instances were found in which local courts or State offices included decrees of separation or other limited decrees in addition to the absolute decrees and annulments which were being sampled; several files not organized to yield accurate counts by data year were identified.

Incompleteness of reporting of items on marriage records was due chiefly to lack of uniformity in kinds of information requested on several record forms; incompleteness of information on divorce records arose mainly from failure to report personal and demographic data.

4. Information about registration

In brief, information consisted of (a) more detailed descriptions of several State and local registration problems, (b) procedures which resulted in delays in reporting, and (c) variations in the items on the forms and in completeness of item reporting.
